C. Copeland Death Learned

PORT KLAMATH — Mrs. Harry Engle has received word of the death on March 18 of her brother, Charles Lester Copeland, 74, at Quesset, British Columbia.

A native of Kansas, he was a member of the pioneer Copeland family of the Wood River Valley, coming to Oregon with his parents when he was a small boy. The family settled near Crystal, 12 miles west of Fort Klamath and later moved to the Wood River Valley.

At the age of 18 he went with his father to Alaska and later settled at Vancouver, British Columbia, where he was a lineman for a telephone company. On New Year's Eve, 1908, he was married to Nellie Glover of Vancouver and they came to Fort Klamath to engage in ranching for 10 years, after which they returned to Canada. Mrs. Copeland's death occurred in 1928.

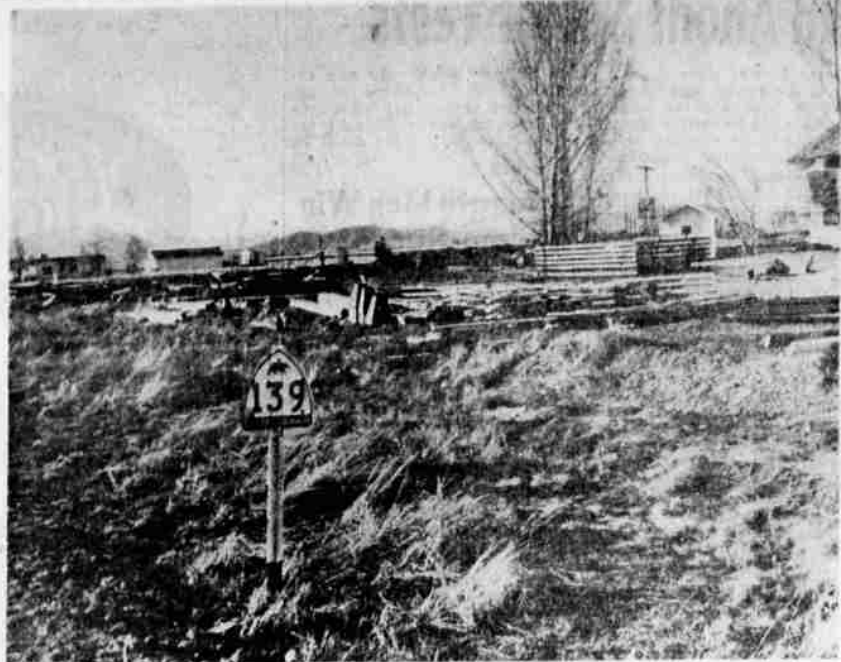

FOUNDATIONS have been laid for five buildings of the new field headquarters for the Klamath Project USBR operations at Tulelake. The buildings will be made available for use by the Tulelake Irrigation district when preliminaries are completed for the district to assume obligations of operation and maintenance.

The two contestants entered the run-off contest with each missing one word in the preliminary tests. Miss Cross missed one word in the oral test and Miss Townley missed one word in the written test, topping all other contestants and placing them in the final test for the championship speller.

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Daylight Saving Time Set In 19 States This Year

NEW YORK. (AP)—Daylight saving time will be observed in all or parts of 19 states and the District of Columbia this year.

A survey showed today that some states have extended it to late October.

Mostly, daylight time will start at 2 a.m., April 29, the last Sunday of the month.

In those areas which have extended it, clocks will be set back to standard time at 2 a.m., Oct. 28. Otherwise, it ends at 2 a.m., Sunday, Sept. 30.

Daylight saving time got its big push in World War I when it was used to save power. But lots of people got to like the extra hour of sunshine in the garden, at the beach, on the golf course or tennis court or in the front porch rocker.

Some organized recreation interests apparently don't. A bill to approve "first time" was introduced in Utah's 1955 Legislature. The House passed it but the Senate killed it. Outdoor movie, night baseball and labor interests opposed it.

Farmers don't like it either. They can't get into the fields before the dew dries anyhow. But they don't hurry up the livestock for feeding.

Daylight time makes for some confusion. The cross-country railroads generally follow standard time. Commuter lines observe local time. The airlines generally list arrivals and departures by local time.

It also gives radio and television networks a hard time in programming, but they solve the problem.

Anyhow, this year "last time" will be observed in whole or in part of California, Connecticut, Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, Nevada, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Vermont, Virginia and the District of Columbia.

In Missouri, only St. Louis will observe it. In New Mexico the atomic city of Los Alamos will be the sole observer.

Burned Forest Seeding Done

LAKEVIEW — Aerial grass seeding of burned forest area in the Fremont National forest was completed last week according to Clifton Windle, in charge of range management on the Fremont.

Approximately 5,150 acres of Fremont land was seeded in the project which was begun last fall and then completed this spring.

When the Summer Lake area was reseeded last week, 100 pounds of bitterbrush seed, furnished by the Oregon State Game Commission, were also sown. Bitterbrush is the main winter feed for deer in this area, stated Windle.

Included in the project was the reseeded of 2,350 acres on Weyerhaeuser Timber Company land, with Weyerhaeuser paying for the seed and broadcasting on their land.

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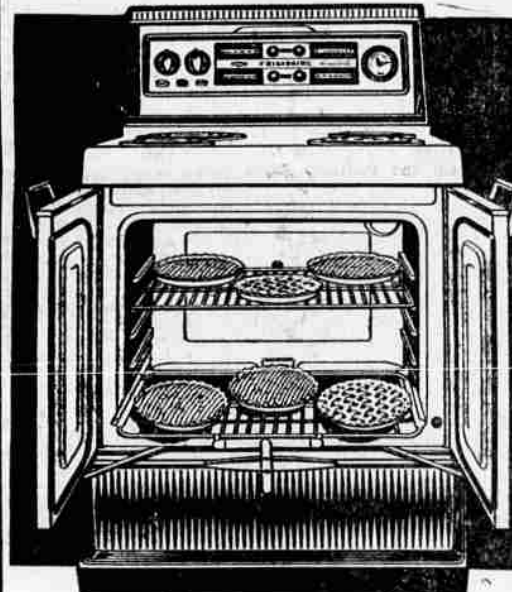
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
