### J-M Officials To Visit KF

A. K. Higbee, vice president in charge of production for the Johns-Manville Corp., and other officials of the firm will be in the Klamath Falls area in the near future to continue plans for the locating of a fiberboard plant near Chiloquin.

Announcement of the visit was made to the directors of the Klamath County Chamber of Commerce at their regular weekly meeting Wednesday noon in the Winema Hotel by R. Frank Tucker, chamber manager.

Johns-Manville has announced plans for the construction of a 12 million dollar insulating board plant near where Highway 97 crosses the Williamson River about 2 1/2 miles north of Klamath Falls.

The operation will use extensive cuttings of jackpine located to the north of the plant site. In further business, the directors acted in opposition to a request from Southern Oregon Hospitality Unlimited, an organization to promote tourist travel in this area, for advertising funds. The board expressed agreement to the principal of the program, but stated it was unable to help financially until more support was received from wavside industries.

The board also heard plans for a Klambassador trip to Tulelake next Wednesday when they will be guests at a Rotary Club luncheon. Plans were announced for a review of the past five years at the April meeting when board members at that time will be special guests. Chamber manager Tucker will review his work since coming to Klamath County in April, 1951.
