

West Counties Eye Money

ROSEBURG (AP)—Borrowing an appeal, about \$600,000 in timber revenue tied up by court action may soon be distributed to the 18 Western Oregon counties comprising the O&C Area.

The money has been tied up pending outcome of a suit by two attorneys for Clackamas County who asked 10 per cent of the total of a fund released last year.

Douglas County Judge Carl C. Hill, association president, received word from O&C Attorney Frank S. Sever of Portland that the U.S. District Court in Washington, D.C., has allowed an O&C motion for summary judgment in the case.

When funds from controverted timberlands were released by congressional action last year, Attorneys R. L. Merrick and A. W. Lafferty were trying to have the funds distributed by court action. Although the legislation brought about the distribution, Lafferty and Merrick brought suit for legal fees. They said their work aided in passage of the bill.

Douglas County would get about \$150,000 of the total since the county has some 25 per cent of the O&C lands.

Ike Designates Safety Week

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower Thursday designated the week of July 22 as National Farm Safety Week.

In a proclamation, Eisenhower said more than 14,000 farm people die each year as the result of accidents.

"There were more accidental deaths among farm workers last year than occurred among the workers of any major industry," the President said.

"I urgently request all farm workers and those who reside on farms to adopt safe practices that will make every day safety day on the farm."

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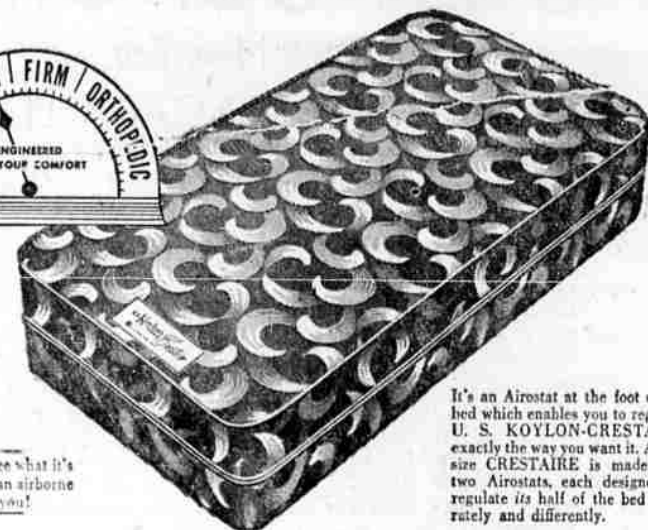
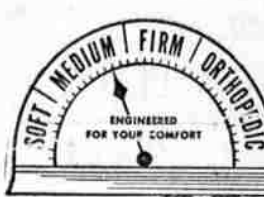
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
