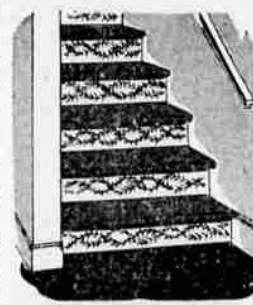
STEPS TO SAFETY

The safety council tells us that the largest percentage of all accidents occur in the home with falls on stairs accounting for almost one-third of home mishaps.

In view of this fact, it behooves every one of us to make every effort possible to make our stairways safer. One helpful way to do this is by painting a light strip at the outer edge of each stair step. Another, and a more colorful and decorative way, is shown in the accompanying sketch. Stair risers have been wallpapered with a gay, colorful design on white background. Then, when the paper had thoroughly dried several coats of lacquer were applied to protect it from toe scuffs.

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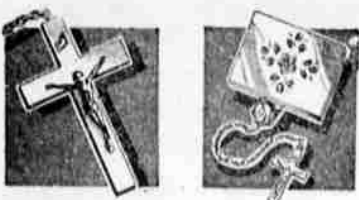
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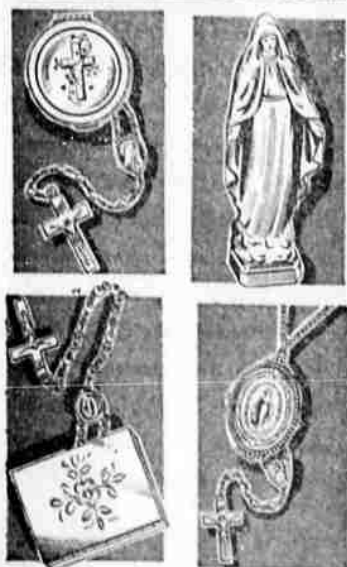
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
