John Korenian Relates Fabulous Tale Orientals To Library Club Members

The fascinating story of Oriental rugs was told to Klamath Women's Library Club members March 12 by John Korenian, importer. The central location of this community and its high, dry climate influenced him when he established his showrooms here, the speaker told his listeners at the club rooms in the city library.

The hope of the master weaver to create one work of art in his lifetime was explained by Mr. Korenian, who explained that most of the master weavers in Persia live as they did two thousand years ago. The infinite patience of the weaver, and his original creative effort were vividly portrayed by the speaker.

He told of the making of vegetable dyes and said that the secret of a certain beautiful blue, or red, for example, would be held inviolate by a family from generation to generation, since the manner of creating this color would be the key to the family's livelihood. He explained that the

Oriental rug expert could tell the district where a rug originates, the sex of the weaver and often his mood by the type of weaving, the color, and the design.

"Oriental rugs must be worn to be beautiful," Mr. Korenian stated. "They improve with washing and walking." He explained that a rug of this type cannot be hung on the wall and acquire the patina of age which increases the value of a fine Oriental floor covering.

The 43-year-old rug woven of all natural-colored silk given Mr. Korenian by Haile Selassie, emperor of Ethiopia, (the only Christian ruler in Africa, he pointed out) was exhibited, along with other museum pieces from his private collection. Saddle bags for camels—also Oriental rugs—and representative types of rugs from the near east were shown by Mr. Korenian who generously answered questions for women in the audience for a long period following his lecture.

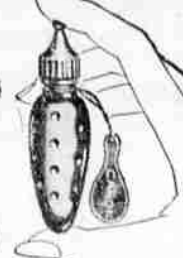
