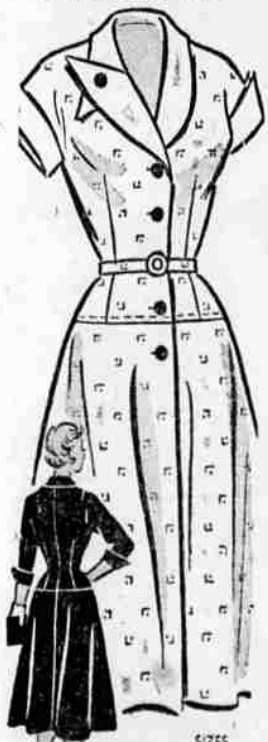
Mrs. Katie Lake, OTI instructor talked briefly on "Adult Education" as it applies to the business woman.
