Agreement Ends 153-Day Strike At Westinghouse; Some Workers Still Out

PITTSBURGH (AP)—Top officials of the independent United Electrical Workers and Westinghouse Electric Corp. agreed last night on a five-year contract to end a 153-day strike.

Membership ratification is needed but James J. Matles, UE director of organization, says he is recommending acceptance.

The pact does not settle a local strike of 6,000 UE members at the firm's South Philadelphia plant. They walked out last Oct. 14, protesting a proposed change in wage payment plans.

The contract covers 3,200 at eight Westinghouse plants where the UE has representation. Terms of the agreement also would be applied to workers in Philadelphia once their local dispute is settled.

Westinghouse said economic clauses in the contract are the same as that signed with the 44,000-member AFL-CIO International Union of Electrical Workers last Tuesday. That agreement ended a 156-day strike.

Negotiations aimed at bringing peace to the big turbine-producing plant in Philadelphia will be resumed there today.

The union local at the eight other plants will vote tomorrow on acceptance of the national agreement. It calls for a minimum hourly wage increase of 25 cents during the pact's life.

The workers formerly averaged \$2.10 an hour.

The pact provides wage increases of from 5 to 17 cents an hour the first year and 5 to 12 cents an hour each of the next four years. In addition, skilled workers will get an immediate hourly increase ranging from one half to 1 1/2 cents.

A cost of living clause calls for a 1-cent hourly pay increase for each half-point rise in the Department of Labor cost of living index. Improved pensions and vacations also are provided.

Effort Launched To Try And Reconcile Concepts Of Theology, Psychiatry

NEW YORK (UP)—Hidden behind a prosaic announcement of the formation of a National Academy of Religion and Mental Health is one of the most profound undertakings of our age—the first big-scale effort to reconcile the conflicting conceptions of theology and the science of psychiatry as to the nature of human beings.

You can get an idea of the depth of conflict when you realize that whereas theology holds that each person has "free will" with which to choose between good and evil, psychiatry holds that each person has an unconscious segment of mind which is "dynamic" and can at least challenge the conscious exercise of free will.

After several years of private meetings and earnest strivings, a group of highly respected leaders in both fields have explored the common concern of religion and science for the well-being of human beings. Religion and science have each conceded that the other has "knowledge concerning human behavior." They have agreed that mental health is indispensable to human well-being and that mental health can only be advanced when all kinds of knowledge of human behavior are related.

Thus, a National Academy of Religion and Mental Health has been launched to sponsor scientific research into relationships between religion and mental health, to promote instruction in psychology for students in the seminaries of all faiths, to aid medical and especially psychiatric students to seek "knowledge from theology and moral philosophy"—among a number of similar projects.

Although the founder of the modern science of psychiatry, Sigmund Freud, was outspokenly anti-religion, the science isn't. As Dr. Kenneth E. Appel, the academy's first president, put it, psychiatry "cannot help but recognize not only a moral sense in human beings but moral values in a patient's environment."

The scope of the academy is obvious in the caliber of its officers. Dr. Appel is a former president of the American Psychiatric Association and professor of psychiatry at the University of Pennsylvania. A vice-president is the Rev. Otis R. Rice, long prominent in affairs of the National Council of Churches of Christ in the U.S.A.

The advisory council includes two Catholic priests and educators, a rabbi, the president of a Baptist theological seminary, two professors of Protestant theology, three professors of psychology, three professors of psychiatry, and two former presidents and the president elect of the American Psychiatric Association.

These leaders who have devoted so much time and energy to launching the academy, acknowledged there had been many difficulties, but as Dr. Appel put it, "many of the difficulties were the same thing with different problems of semantics"—of religious and scientific terminology.

Plants affected by the UE agreement are the Nuttall works in Pittsburgh; Derby, Pa.; Jersey City, N.J.; Bridgeport, Conn.; Detroit; Chicago; Emeryville, Calif.; and Seattle, Wash.
