Osburn Rites On Thursday

Funeral services for Evert Dalton Osburn, 22, of Klamath Falls, driver of one of the two autos involved in a two-car accident which resulted in the death of two persons and the hospitalization of a third, early Saturday morning, will be held at 2:30 p.m. Thursday at Ward's Klamath Funeral Home.

The injured man, Kenneth Mal Dyer, 27, Shasta Way, is still hospitalized at Klamath Valley Hospital with facial injuries. Attendants said this morning he is in good condition.

Final rites for Robert McKinley Gentry, 32, of Klamath Falls, the other dead man, who was a passenger in an auto driven by Dyer, will be held at 3:30 p.m. Tuesday at Ward's with the Rev. D. L. Proett of Peace Memorial Church officiating.

The accident occurred shortly after 1 a.m. Saturday on South Sixth Street near the Lucky Lane bowling alley. According to State Police, Osburn's westbound auto, traveling at high speed, failed to make the long, sweeping curve, hopped the curb of the center strip, skidded for more than 450 feet, and slammed broadside into Dyer's eastbound auto.

River Pact Meetings Held Here

The joint drafting committee of the California and Oregon Klamath River Commissions this morning opened a two-day meeting to iron out certain objections to the proposed interstate compact on the use of the waters of the Upper Klamath River Basin.

According to Nelson Reed, chairman of the Oregon commission, the meetings, being held today and Tuesday at the Willard Hotel, were called in order to rewrite the portions of the draft of October 19, which was submitted to all agencies the commissions felt would be interested.

At a recent meeting in Washington, D.C., attended by several members of both commissions, Justice Department officials outlined their objections. According to a commissioner present at the Washington meeting, the Justice Department had no objections to the intent of the compact, but felt that the wording of certain portions of it were unconstitutional.

Reed said that the commissions desired to have the draft in as good shape as possible before submitting it to the State Legislatures of California and Oregon. The legislatures, the U.S. Congress and the President must all approve the compact before it goes into effect.

The commissions plan several public hearings, including one in Klamath Falls, before submitting the compact to the legislatures.

Death Takes E. H. Dent

Edgar H. Dent, 51, injured in a fall from a two-story house in mid-afternoon March 24 at Merrill, died in a Medford Hospital.

Dent, member of the Dent House Moving Firm, Klamath Falls, was assisting with the moving of a frame structure from the Alfred Carleton ranch north of Merrill to a site near the Merrill elementary school. He was attempting to raise electric power and telephone wires above the chimney as the structure neared the Carleton plant on the Hill road approaching town when he slipped and fell striking his head.

He was rushed to Klamath Valley Hospital by Kaler's ambulance, which later made an emergency run to a brain specialist at Medford with the injured man.
