The Midland Community Club, organized as a women's civic group in the Midland district 12 years ago, is undertaking its most ambitious project this year, according to Mrs. Clark L. (Jennie) Leach, president. The group's first president was Mrs. John Mistler and Mrs. Leach has been active in the organization since she and her husband bought the Midland Store three years ago.

The project is the development of a Midland community park. The women decided to enlist the aid of the men in the district with the result that the club and the Midland Park Board have joined in the program.

Earlier in March the two groups purchased for \$100 on bid the old Henley High School building which had been advertised for sale and removal by the Klamath County school district. It is adjacent to the present Henley High School industrial arts shop and its removal will allow space for the construction of an additional shop at some future date.

M. R. Myers Dies Sunday

LAKEVIEW—Milton Richard Myers, 23, son of Mr. and Mrs. Homer A. Myers, died at 2 p.m. Sunday in Lakeview Hospital following a Saturday night wreck in which his car was demolished.

According to state patrolman Bill Warren, Myers was returning from New Pine Creek and about nine miles south of Lakeview lost control of his automobile. The accident happened about 11:35 p.m. Warren said the car crossed to the right-hand lane and back to the left and went end over end several times in a borrow pit alongside the road. The car traveled some 230 feet after leaving the highway. Myers was thrown 12 feet.

The Lakeview disaster car, operated by Doug Fetsch, Dean North and Delmar McGrath, brought Myers to the hospital.

A 1951 graduate of Lakeview High School, he attended Oregon Tech until 1953 when he enlisted in the Army for two years. He served 18 months overseas.

In addition to his parents, survivors include a sister, Mrs. Virginia Strout of Portland; a brother, Douglas Myers of Lakeview; and grandparents, the Rev. and Mrs. Laurence D. Myers of New Pine Creek.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p.m. Tuesday from the First Baptist Church with interment in Sunset Park. Ousley-Osterman Funeral Home is in charge of arrangements.

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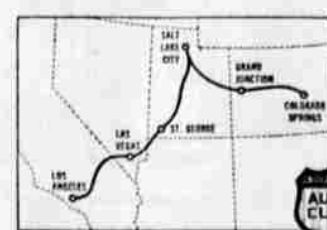

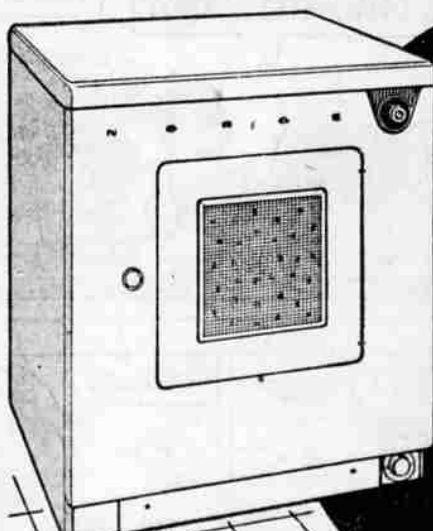


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
