'Bad' Ginger Ale Poisons Three On Ike's Coach

WHITE SULPHUR SPRINGS, W.Va. (UP)—One of three persons stricken with gastric upsets aboard a swank railroad car later used by President Eisenhower was reported today suffering from "acute uremic poisoning."
The U.S. Secret Service was investigating all aspects of the case—including the possibility that ginger ale which the railroad said the victims drank was poisoned. But the Secret Service's preliminary investigation uncovered no evidence that the incident resulted from anything but accidental causes.
White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerty said the President was protected by "full security measures" before boarding the car for the trip here from Washington Sunday night — three days after the incident. Hagerty said he was "not at all concerned" about the President's safety.
A spokesman for the Chesapeake & Ohio Railroad — owner of the car — said three railroad employees suffered "upset stomachs" last Thursday after drinking the ginger ale. He said the ginger ale may have come from a long unused ice box on the car.
One of the victims — Nelson R. Hervig of Lakewood, Ohio — was reported in "rather serious" condition in Sibley Hospital at Washington. Dr. Robert Hotel, physician in charge of the case, said Hervig suffered from "acute uremic poisoning."
Another victim — an unidentified woman — was hospitalized in Huntington, W.Va. The Huntington

Advertiser said she suffered from "acute poisoning."
The newspaper quoted the woman as saying she drank a soft drink that had a "cloudy look." It quoted her as saying she was told later the bottle contained ammonia.
The third victim — also a woman — recovered. She also was not immediately identified.
Howard Skidmore, C & O public relations director, said the three railroad employees drank the ginger ale while the car was being prepared for a test run from Huntington to Washington. The car — the Chessie 29 — is usually used

by C & O President Walter J. Touhy.
Skidmore said ginger ale was served and that some who drank it complained of its taste. Later the same night the three employees became ill.
