Memorial Highway Surfacing Slated

MOUNT SHASTA—Bids for realignment and surfacing of 15 miles of John Everett Memorial highway from Mount Shasta to timberline on Mt. Shasta will be invited within a month, forest service and bureau of roads officials have announced.

Plans to begin work were speeded at a meeting here last week. Rights of way were also discussed at the meeting.

An appropriation of \$380,000 by the bureau of roads and \$60,000 by Siskiyou County is making the highway possible.

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Logger Says 'Too Costly'

SPOKANE (UP)—The president of the Intermountain Logging Conference forecast Monday a continued demand for lumber but said "in my opinion, we are on the verge of pricing ourselves out of the market."

Gordon A. MacGregor of Boise, addressing the first session of the Conference, said "the rapid rise in stumpage prices, production costs and consequent selling price can lead to our industry's relegation to a minor position."

"Transaction evidence, resulting from heated oral bidding on timber sales between operators whose plants are out of stumpage, is surely no indication of true stumpage values," he said.

"We have no scarcity of timber and under continued good forest management we can grow more wood than we can market even under our expanding economy."

MacGregor said a more accelerated timber access road program is needed, and added: "Our salvage cutting continues to lag behind the devastating attacks by insects and disease. Sound timber management is not and cannot be practiced to take care of the astronomical losses on our timberlands today until the road program gets further ahead."

About 700 persons were registered for the opening session.
