KF GOP Hear Ike, Governor

President Dwight D. Eisenhower, speaking on a state-wide telephone hookup Monday evening, urged members of all Republican groups to place emphasis on participation in the coming primary and general elections throughout the country.

The brief talk was heard here by those attending a workshop meeting called by George Proctor, chairman of the Klamath County Republican Committee and attended by members of that committee, precinct committeemen and committeewomen and county and state Republican candidates for office.

The President's talk was followed by a telephone speech of Governor Elmo Smith of Oregon who gave a brief message on the importance of registration work and by Wendell Wyatt, chairman of the state central committee. Proctor reviewed the accomplishments of the local central committee in the last few months.

Floyd Wynne, alternate vice chairman of the central committee, outlined the completed campaign promises of the President and urged strong continuing support of the administration.

Candidates made brief comments.

Basin Farmers Get Warning

Klamath County farmers who have 1935 commodities under purchase agreement and which are stored in other than approved warehouses have until March 31 for wheat and April 30 for barley, oats and rye to notify the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee of intent to sell the commodity to the Commodity Credit Corporation.

William Burnett, chairman of the Klamath Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, explains that farmers who wish to turn such commodities over to CCC must notify the ASC office of their intent within a 30-day period in advance of the purchase agreement maturity date. A preliminary inspection will be made at no cost to the producer. Purchase agreement commodities of the 1935 crop which may be turned over to CCC if they meet the minimum requirements, are wheat, barley, oats and rye.

Burnett explains that under the terms of the purchase agreement only, commodities meeting minimum eligibility requirements will be accepted by CCC. If, through error, below-quality commodities are included in the delivery the settlement rate will be on the basis of the market price for the quality delivered.

Pre-delivery inspections are made, says the chairman, to avoid acceptance of ineligible grain, to enable producers, where possible, to recondition grain that may be found unacceptable, and to enable producers to dispose of grain found to be of below-quality to the best advantage.

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Wool Warning Given Growers

Wool growers are reminded to get their applications for payment under the wool program in the mail before May 1. If they want to get their incentive payment this year, the reminder comes from E. Harvey Miller, chairman of the Oregon Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

According to the chairman, wool sales made after March 31, 1935 and before April 1, are eligible for payment this year provided the application for payment with the necessary supporting information is in the mail before May 1.

Wool growers are urged to be especially careful about providing the required sales record when submitting applications. The sales record for shorn wool must show name and address of buyer, date of sale, name and address of producer, net weight of wool sold, and net proceeds to producer after normal deductions.

Those who market lambs and yearlings for slaughter must provide bill of sale with name and address of slaughterer; date of sale; name and address of seller; and number, description, and net live weight of animals sold. They also must certify that the animals were purchased for slaughter, and that they had or had not been shorn at the time of sale. 30-day ownership is required to be eligible for payment.

Stevenson Urges 'Greater Speed'

NEW YORK (AP)—Adlai E. Stevenson has urged "greater speed" in ending "unfair discrimination against any of our citizens."

The candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination made his comment in a statement sent to a committee of editors of foreign language newspapers supporting him.

The nation, he said, "must, with greater speed and more determination than ever before, bring an end to unfair discrimination against any of our citizens until we can truthfully say that this is a land of equal opportunity."

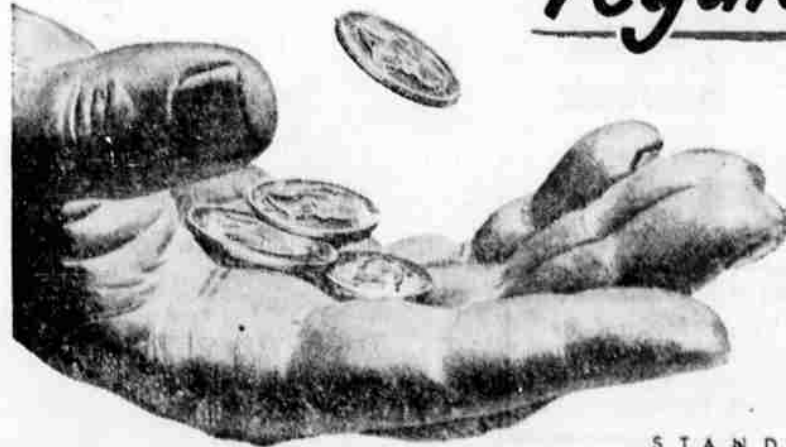
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
