Cards Boast Top W-L Mark In Senior Loop

Considering that the Pittsburgh Pirates put together the best record among major league teams last spring, there's no reason for the St. Louis Cardinals to rejoice because they're making a juicy showing in the Grapefruit League.

But the fact is that the Cards, woefully weak in pitching the past few years, are getting loads of good chucking in the exhibition games. They've won 11 games and lost 7 for the best spring mark among National League teams.

And improved pitching has been evident in just about every one of their 18 outings. In no game did the Cards have more than seven runs scored against them. They've won by 1-0, 2-1 and three times by 3-2. Their losses, too, were squeakers—by 1-2 (twice), 1-3 and 3-4 (twice).

Luis Arroyo and Tom Poholsky each have picked up two victories. The others went to Vinegar Bend Mizell, Larry Kasper, Ellis Kinder, Ben Flowers, Stu Miller, Harvey Haddix and Gary Blaylock.

Yesterday Arroyo got the win as the Cards nipped the Milwaukee Braves 2-1. The St. Louis trio—Mizell, Arroyo and Kinder—limited the Braves to two hits. The

Cards picked up the winning run in the seventh inning on singles by Joe Cunningham and Bill Virdon and an infield out.

Trailing the Cards in the National League grapefruit standings are the Cincinnati Redlegs, New York Giants and champion Brooklyn Dodgers with 10 victories against 8 setbacks, Pittsburgh, which led with a 10-11 record last spring, is 9-8 this time as are the Chicago Cubs. The Braves are 8-9 and the Philadelphia Phillies bring up the rear with 7-10.

The New York Yankees, idle yesterday, top the American League with 11-6. Then come Chicago with 10-6, Cleveland 11-7, Kansas City 8-7, Boston 7-9, Washington 5-9, Baltimore 5-12 and Detroit 4-13.

The White Sox were knocked out of the lead yesterday, by dropping a 7-3 decision to the Red Sox. Jim Piersall paced a late Boston rally, driving in three of the four runs the Red Sox scored in the seventh and eighth innings.

In other games, the Dodgers beat the Phillies 6-2, the Pirates downed the Redlegs 5-4, the Cubs outslugged the Giants 13-10, the Athletics dumped Detroit 7-2 and Cleveland nipped Baltimore 8-7.

Target Of California Ring Probe Defended

LOS ANGELES (U)—Matchmaker Babe McCoy, so-called czar of boxing in Southern California and a target for much of the testimony to date, found a champion Wednesday as the governor's committee resumed its investigation of the sport in the state.

McCoy, of the Olympic Auditorium, was not expected to resume his appearance on the witness stand until later in the week, because of poor health. But chief investigator James J. Cox summoned Willie Ginzberg, another "leg man" for the portly matchmaker.

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She testified under oath after Eaton, whose son is married to Gov. Knight's daughter, pleaded that she be given a chance to refute testimony given the day before by a former heavyweight, Watson Jones.

Jones testified he had been in four "tank fights" and he involved McCoy in three of them. During the course of his testimony he observed that he had been "robbed" by both Mrs. Eaton and McCoy of purse money.

Heatedly, Mrs. Eaton denied the accusation and declared that "by conservative estimate, Mr. Eaton and I have given Watson Jones at least \$1,000 since he quit fighting."

She then told the committee that only last week Jones had telephoned and told her he had been threatened with jail unless he "said some bad things about Babe McCoy."

Jones, she continued, told her two "policemen" had taken him from his job to the state building and "tried to force him to testify against McCoy."

She said she told Jones just to tell the truth, that McCoy had nothing to hide.

"Someone," said Mrs. Eaton, "must have gotten to him after that."

Cox did not question Mrs. Eaton. He continued to examine witnesses, seeking to connect McCoy as the silent manager of several fighters, notably Don Jordan, local ranking lightweight.

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
