SA To Conduct Friday Rites

Senior Major and Mrs. Leonard Adams will conduct services at the Salvation Army, 400 Klamath Avenue Easter weekend. There will be a Good Friday service starting at noon Friday and two services Sunday, at 11 a.m. and 7:30 p.m. Major Adams received his training as a Salvation Army officer at the International Training College in London, England and commanded several corps in Great Britain. He was appointed to international headquarters in London, and gave missionary service in China, Burma and India. He was loaned to the British government during World War II and served as British consular official. Following a brief furlough in England in 1945, he returned to the Hong Kong government as relief and welfare officer, returning to England in 1947 where he received an appointment to the Goodwill Department of National Headquarters. He transferred to the western territory of the United States in 1949, holding appointments in Men's Social Service in Pasadena and Oakland, then corps appointments in Billings, Montana, and San Francisco prior to coming to the Oregon-Southern Idaho Division as "director of young peoples' activities."

Indiana Vote Program Told

INDIANAPOLIS (AP)—Indiana's presidential preference primary May 8 shaped up today as a popularity contest between Sen. Estes Kefauver, unopposed on the Democratic ballot, and President Eisenhower, with only a splinter-group Republican opponent. Kefauver's Indiana backers planned to file his entry today. The President's name was entered March 6 by Gov. George N. Craig, ardent supporter of the Eisenhower administration, with Eisenhower's approval. Let Daly, 44-year-old Chicago furniture manufacturer who calls himself an "America First Republican" and campaigns in an Uncle Sam costume, said he would file in the Republican primary late today. Adlai Stevenson's national campaign headquarters said he would not enter the Indiana primary.
