

# Brothers Donate Needed Ambulance To Community

WEED — Bob and Jim Mallory, two Weed-business men, are donating a 1956 ambulance to the community of Weed and the surrounding area for use as soon as necessary equipment and insurance are secured.

The new ambulance will be housed at the Long-Bell fire station in Weed, the facilities made possible by the Long-Bell Lumber Company, Weed Division. Officials and drivers will be local persons on call 24 hours a day.

Weed doctors H. L. Vidricksen and Victor Thompson have offered to train the ambulance drivers.

Accounting services needed for the operation of the ambulance have also been offered for handling by the Weed Clinic, through the courtesy of the two local doctors.

The lowest possible charge will be made for people of Weed using the ambulance, to provide for the drivers' time and maintenance on the ambulance. Calls made outside of this area will be charged at the current ambulance rate.

Once equipped and insured it is hoped that the ambulance will be self-supporting, but for the introductory use the vehicle must first be equipped.

Equipment needed includes a red light, siren, stretcher, portable stretcher, first aid kit, two blankets, insurance and a resuscitator.

Jim Mallory is serving as secretary for a Weed community ambulance fund and will accept donations from organizations or interested persons who wish to donate toward the ambulance equipment fund. A complete accounting of the donations will be published when the necessary fund is fulfilled.

When interviewed this week, the Mallory brothers stated their reason for giving the ambulance was to assist in saving a life of an injured or ill person who may receive more prompt attention with the ambulance service.

"We also wish to show our appreciation to the people in this area for their support of our business in Weed, and the ambulance seemed the most worthwhile way to show that esteem to the public," they stated.

The two Mallory brothers have been residents of Weed since 1926, both graduates of the Weed schools and veterans of World War II. They purchased the local Chevrolet and garage business from their father, R. V. Mallory in April 1954.
