Actor Tangles With Marine

HONOLULU (UP)—Actor Burgess Meredith came out on the short end of a brief but free-swinging battle with a husky Marine Monday that eye-witnesses said started when the Marine made a "derogatory" remark about the actor's wife, Kaja.

Meredith came out of the two-punch scuffle with a cut on one cheek, despite the assistance of Mrs. Meredith who doused the leatherneck with a glass of water.

Armed services police broke up the fight after the stage and screen actor and Sgt. Ralph W. Mazzarella had each tossed one punch.

Neither party preferred charges and the matter was dropped.

Buck Buchwald, city editor of the Honolulu Advertiser, was a witness to the brief affair. He said the Marine made a "derogatory" remark about Mrs. Meredith as the couple entered the Mayflower restaurant on Waikiki Beach.

The actor was quoted as telling his wife, "Pay no attention to that idiot."

The Marine objected and approached Meredith's table whereupon Mrs. Meredith flung a glass of water into his face, Mazzarella retaliated by hurling a glass of water on Meredith and dousing Mrs. Meredith with a cup of coffee.

Buchwald said Meredith remarked later that "I'm not going to let this little matter interfere with my Hawaiian vacation. I'm sure that sergeant is not representative of the entire Marine Corps."

Five New Records Set At National Air Show

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP)—Five new records set at the National Air Show here pointed dramatically to the advances in the aviation industry and the new jet strength of the armed forces.

The show was climaxed yesterday with the announcement that a Navy supersonic fighter plane—the Chance Vought F4U Crusader—has set a National speed record of 1,015.423 m.p.h. in winning the Thompson Trophy Event.

The jet plane and the pilot who flew it to a record, Cmdr. Robert W. "Duke" Windsor, drew plaudits from the 41,070 air show spectators with a streaking demonstration of the plane's speed and maneuverability.

TIMED FLIGHT
Windsor set the record Aug. 21 in a timed flight over China Lake, Calif., pushing the Crusader to 1½ times the speed of sound. He broke the former American record of 822.135 posted Aug. 20, 1955, by Air Force Col. Horace A. Hanes, flying an F100 Super Sabre.

However, Windsor's mark still is short of the official world's record of 1,132 m.p.h. of a British Fairey Delta, and is far below the unofficial speeds of other U.S. planes.

The new Air Force plane, F104 Starfighter which also made its public debut at the air show, reportedly has flown at 1,400 m.p.h. and American research planes have been timed up to 1,900 m.p.h.

Other planes made record flights during the three-day air show. An F100 Super Sabre piloted by Capt. Manuel J. Fernandez Jr.

Adlai Stevenson Plans American Legion Speech

CHICAGO (AP)—Adlai E. Stevenson took an abbreviated breather today between a seven-speech Labor Day sortie into Michigan and his second political invasion of the Far West within a week.

The Democratic presidential nominee takes off around 3 p.m. EST for Los Angeles and an address tomorrow to the American Legion Convention. Last week Stevenson hopped to Santa Fe, N.M., and Vancouver, Wash., to start a series of regional political powwows in advance of a campaign whose "official" kick-off time still is 10 days away—Sept. 13 at Harrisburg, Pa.

It may not have been official, but it certainly was campaigning yesterday.

"I've had a most wonderful day in Michigan," Stevenson beamed to a huge throng attending the State Fair.

He had pounded around the state by plane and car, seeing and talking to tens of thousands of people. More important politically, these people had a chance to look over Stevenson, 1956 version. And they appeared to be friendly audiences, generous with applause and cheers and whistles—even those in which a sprinkling of "Ike" buttressed turned up.

Stevenson and Gov. G. Mennen Williams, trying for a fifth term, praised each other at every stop. Walter Reuther, president of the big United Auto Workers Union, was in there pitching for both, sometimes harder than either Stevenson or Williams.

State Democratic Chairman Neil Staebler said it was an entirely different Stevenson from the one of 1952. He told a reporter that people were standing on tiptoes and stretching to see and hear the candidate this year and nothing like that happened four years ago.

So, he said, the outlook is "wonderful and totally different. In 1952 the people were puzzled and bewildered. Now they are eager to go along."

They were cheered on the Monaco platform by a thousand Monegasques shouting "Vive le Prince et la Princesse."

OTHER RECORDS
There were two other records set at the air show. An Army Bell H13-1 helicopter hovered 57 hours, 45 minutes without touching the ground and an engine-changing team from Webb Air Force Base at Big Spring, Tex., performed an 8 minute 18.8 second engine change on a Lockheed T33 jet plane.

There were many firsts in the show, where 27 new airplanes and missiles were shown to the public for the first time.

Probably the major addition was three new trophy events, the North American, McDonnell and Douglas, all staged by Navy pilots racing at near super sonic speeds from the carrier Shangri-La off the West Coast.

An F3J Fury jet piloted by Lt. J.G. David K. Grosshuesch of Sheboygan, Wis., won the North American with a speed of 537.849 m.p.h. The McDonnell was won by Lt. Ralph Carson in an F3H Demon jet flying 568.907 m.p.h. and the Douglas trophy for AD3 long-range jet bombers was taken by Capt. J. T. Blackburn, who sped to the air show at 606.557 m.p.h.
