Clarence Turley Slated For Realtor Meet Speech

Clarence M. Turley, St. Louis realtor and president of the National Association of Real Estate Boards, will be the keynote speaker at Oregon's 1956 Real Estate Convention to be held in Salem, September 16, 17 and 18.

Turley has long been a leader in professional real estate activities. During his 40-year career, he has served as president of NAREB's American Institute of Real Estate Appraisers (in 1952); president of the National Association of Building Owners and Managers (in 1936); president of the St. Louis Real Estate Board (in 1942); vice president of the Urban Land Institute (in 1953); and for many years, a member of NAREB's board of directors and its executive committee.

After graduation from Benton College of Law in 1916, he was admitted to the Missouri bar. He began his business life in 1918, working for a St. Louis real estate firm, Isaac T. Cook Company, and in 1928 resigned as vice president of the company to open his own firm which was later called Clarence M. Turley, Inc., of which he is president.

In the educational field, Turley has been a member of the staff of University College, Washington University, lecturing on real estate valuation. He is a trustee and chairman of the finance committee of Carthage College, Carthage, Illinois.

In addition to his professional and education activities, Turley has served as a member of the St. Louis Council, Junior Chamber of Commerce of St. Louis.

Turley was born September 16, 1893, in St. Louis, and is married to the former Ruth Alvina Kober. They have a daughter, Ruth Jeanne, now Mrs. H. E. Heizer; and a son, Clarence M. Turley Jr., who is associated with his father in business.

Blast Touches Off Mine Fire

MYTON, Utah (AP)—Black smoke poured from the shaft of the small Pariett Gilsonite Mine today following an underground blast that touched off a fire in the isolated diggings late yesterday.

But, the mine's estimated 25 employees had ended operations for the day and left for home about an hour before the blast. There were no injuries, but mine Supt. Robert Ferron said the mine itself would be a total loss.

A gilsonite mine explosion at Bonanza, Utah, further east, killed eight men in November 1953. Gilsonite is a solid petroleum substance similar to asphalt.

Cooler Air Moves East

 Cooler air continued to move eastward today and had over-spread the Great Lakes region.

In northern sections of the Great Lakes temperature drops were sharp. Grand Marais, Mich., had a drop of 21 degrees, from 59 Monday night to 38 late last night. Temperatures elsewhere in the area mostly were in the 40s, with a few in the 30s.

Showers and thunderstorms were reported from the western upper Mississippi River Valley, the northern portions of the middle Mississippi Valley and through the Northern and Central Plains States. At Grantsburg, Wis., 1.14 inches of rain fell in a six hour period. St. Cloud, Minn., had 1.12 inches.

Rain also fell along the Gulf of Mexico Coast, with Apalachicola, Fla., reporting 1.68 inches in 24 hours. The Southeastern portion of the country also had widely scattered showers.

Military Training Plan Asked By Legion Leader

LOS ANGELES (UP)—The American Legion has been urged by its retiring commander J. Addington Wagner, to fight for compulsory military training because the volunteer reserve program "has failed."

The commander of the 2,800 Legionnaires got the group's 38th annual national convention down to serious business yesterday by submitting his final report. The report also advocated:

1—A continued battle for a new veteran's security bill which would pay \$105-monthly pensions to World War I veterans over 65.

2—A continued effort to secure a Congressional investigation of UNESCO and the U.S. Commission for UNESCO.

The report was an indication of what the Legion program would be for the coming year.

Wagner told the convention that the Legion's work of the past year "to expose the danger to America represented by the Fund For The Republic has borne good fruit."

(Rep. Olin E. Eague, (D-Tex.), Chairman of the House Veterans Affairs Committee, was accused in the report of being a party to the scuttling of the Legion-recommended war veterans' security bill in the 1956 congress.

The bill proposed to declare all World War I vets over 65 "totally disabled" if their income was less than \$1,400 annually and they have no dependents, or \$2,700 if they have dependents. Those falling in the category would be entitled to \$105 monthly pension.
