Fourth Video Station Set

PORTLAND (AP) — An antenna went up Tuesday for what will be Portland's fourth television station.

The station, KGW-TV, is expected to begin regular broadcasts on Channel 8 in December.

The antenna is on a 600-foot tower high on the hills of northwest Portland.

The station is owned by North Pacific Television, Inc. The majority stock belongs to the King Broadcasting Co. of Seattle.

There were unconfirmed reports here that the new station was to get the American Broadcasting Co. network affiliation, now held by KFOR on Channel 12. The source of these reports was not clear. At Seattle, King Broadcasting Co. officials were quoted as saying they had no comment now but would not deny the reports. There had been talk earlier that KGW-TV might get NBC programs which now are telecast by KPTV, the UHF station on channel 27.

Auto Firms Tell Figures

DETROIT (AP) — The auto industry's "big three" of General Motors, Ford and Chrysler built 3,908,531 passenger cars in this year's first eight months, compared with 3,263,272 in the same 1955 period.

The figures, announced by the several companies Wednesday, showed GM produced 2,205,972 units; Ford 1,102,097 and Chrysler 600,462. In the like 1955 period GM accounted for 2,809,013; Ford 1,496,943 and Chrysler 957,316 cars.

GM's biggest producer, Chevrolet, built 1,136,747 cars against 1,274,971 in last year's January-August period; Ford's Ford division accounted for 884,094 cars this year against 1,179,291 last year and Chrysler's Plymouth division reported 313,373 assemblies this year compared with 335,582 for the same 1955 period.

American Motors and Studebaker-Packard Corp. announced no production figures. Unofficial totals, however, showed American Motors built 67,945 cars in this year's first eight months, compared with 123,512 in the same 1955 period. Studebaker-Packard's output this year came to 67,317 units compared with 138,801 in the like 1955 period.

Crash Injures Student Trio

Three students, two from Seattle and the other from Eugene, were taken to Klamath Valley Hospital early this morning when their auto rammed a parked house trailer on Highway 97 a short distance south of Diamond Lake Junction.

According to ambulance operator, Jim Kaler, the injured were Eugene Y. K. Mak, 21, of Eugene, driver of the car, Chang Teh-huang, 29, of Seattle and Dolores Wong, 22, of Seattle.

Hospital attendants said that Chang had a neck injury and Miss Wong had a bad laceration on her forehead. Both were said to be doing very well. Mak was treated for minor injuries and released.

Mak told Kaler that he rammed the trailer after the driver of the auto pulling it had parked when his lights failed. The trailer, Kaler said, was almost totally destroyed. Impact of the collision pushed the towing auto over on its side.

State police reports this morning did not show the names of the occupants of the trailer combination. Kaler said they saw Mak coming and got out, escaping injury.

Mak is a student at the University of Oregon, and the other two attend the University of Washington.

Farni Faces Kidnap Charge

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP)—Raymond Joe Farni must go to Reno, Nev., to face federal charges of kidnapping his wife and two other persons from Rieth, Ore.

Federal Commissioner C. B. Wilson on Tuesday ordered the removal of Farni, who is accused of forcing his wife, Rosie; his mother-in-law, Mrs. Eva Roberts, and a friend, Joe R. Thomas, into his car at gunpoint Aug. 26.

Mrs. Roberts and Thomas said they were bound hand and foot and left in the desert near Winnemucca, Nev. A kidnap warrant was issued at Reno.

Farni and his wife were found at Phoenix last week. The commissioner left unchanged the \$25,000 bond Farni would have to post to gain release from jail.

Body Found Atop Power Lines

PENDLETON (AP) — The body of Orville C. McKamey, 36, Orofino, Idaho, was found atop a flour mill Tuesday, hanging from the high voltage wires that had killed him.

The body had been burned badly. Dist. Atty. John Walker said it had not been determined how McKamey got there. He said there was some indication that the death occurred Monday.

He said McKamey had been released from jail Saturday after being held on a drunk charge. He also said that McKamey had been in the Eastern Oregon hospital, a mental institution, twice.

Forest Service Employee Tracks Down Litterbugs

DUNSMUIR — Pawing through other people's rubbish is an unpleasant and thankless task. Ted Schuler, U.S. Forest Service employee, admitted this week. But identifying those who illegally dump trash is a means of curbing litterbugs who create unsightly messes on federal and privately owned property.

As a result of investigations by Sacramento district personnel of the Shasta Trinity forest, several arrests have been made. Troy Carraway of Dunsmuir was fined \$25 in the local judicial court last week for illegal dumping. Six other local cases were dismissed and a 16-year-old youth who had been hired to haul rubbish away was

directed by Judge A. A. Smith to remove it from private property. The lad was placed on 30 days probation. Three warrants against other Dunsmuir residents are outstanding, Judge Smith said.

Schuler pointed out that adequate provision for dumping in this area is provided at the Mount Shasta dump, cooperatively maintained by Mount Shasta and Siskiyou County. The Dunsmuir city dump may be used for limited dumping, also, he said. Any forest service employee or any private citizen can sign a complaint for illegal dumping outside an incorporated area under the state law, Schuler added.

"Sooner or later unsightly trash comes to light," he said. "Most of it can be identified by address labels, receipts or envelopes. Some of the complaints upon which warrants were issued during the current campaign were for trash dumps spotted by airplanes during forest reconnaissance flights."

Rubbish constitutes a fire hazard, too, Schuler said. Stove ashes, oily rags and liquid-filled bottles can be the cause of timber-destroying fires. Later in the year, the forest service personnel will have the task of burning and bulldozing over some of these dumps to restore the land to beauty and use.

Frost Nips Potato Vines

PRINEVILLE (AP) — Frost has nipped potato vines in Central Oregon three recent nights, and crop experts estimate the loss will run about \$250,000 in Crook County alone.

They said the county's crop, which had been expected to be worth a million dollars to the growers, apparently would be about 25 per cent short because of the cold weather.

The chilly temperatures affected potato vines from Maupin south to Bend. Some growers expect nearly a complete loss. Others escaped lightly.

Those affected said the chill caught the potatoes at the period of greatest growth, and that as a consequence the potatoes may be small and few to the hill.

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
