

Fourth Annual Italian Carnivale Set Saturday

WEED—Two full days of entertainment are scheduled for the fourth annual Italian Carnivale here Saturday and Sunday, September 8-9.

Amusement rides of the Gold Coast Shows will open the carnival Thursday, which officially begins with the Kiddy Parade at 11 a.m. Saturday morning. The parade will terminate at the main playground for the awarding of prizes and the afternoon games and events ending with a greased pig scramble.

Eddie Bartlett and Lady Frances will star in the Hollywood TV Personality Show starting at 8:30 p.m. Saturday at the Hippodrome, followed by the Carnivale Queen's Coronation Ball with music by the Hotentots.

Contestants for queen are Jeanette Morris and Gezelde DelGallo of Weed and Lois Ahlenstorf of Carol Gill of McCloud. After the coronation at 11 p.m., the queen

will be escorted by Lewis Iuzzi, 1955 Spaghetti King, for the remainder of the celebration.

The general parade will start at the Weed Hotel at 1 p.m. Sunday, with out of town entries, and numerous floats from Northern California and Southern Oregon.

A special drill and concert by the Klamath Falls Bugle Corps will follow the parade at the main playground park. Grand marshal honors of the parade will be held by the Siskiyou County Board of Supervisors, a parade chairman Judge Kenneth T. Stone announced this week.

Sunday afternoon there will be a softball game, a bugle corps performance at the playground park, a tug-of-war on Main Street at 4 p.m., an accordion band concert on Main Street at 5 p.m.

The Spaghetti King contest will begin at 5:30 p.m., the winner of the "speed eating" event to be clocked for speed in eating a bowl of spaghetti and sauce of about two pounds. Chairman Lou Sbarbaro will accept entrants until Saturday noon. Awards for the "mostaccio" contest will be made following the spaghetti eating event.

A three hour amateur show Sunday night at the Weed Theater will climax the two day celebration. Booths sponsored by various organizations will be open on Main Street for the entire festival, and Jerro, the clown from Redding, will be on hand.

Mrs. Rena Santini is the general chairman, with Chester Marshall and Dave Sbarbaro the assistants for the 1956 Carnivale.

Pacific Northwest Farms Lag Behind Pond Output

WASHINGTON (AP)—Despite a recent spurt, Oregon and Washington farmers have developed less than a quarter the number of farm ponds which the Soil Conservation Service (SCS) figures are necessary for proper conservation.

The agency's records show that Oregon farmers called for technical aid last year to build 221 ponds for livestock watering places, irrigation sources or to control water runoff. It brought the total number in the state to 1,798.

In neighboring Washington, an additional 118 ponds were placed in service, bringing the state's total to 1,115.

By contrast, Oregon had only 373 ponds in 1950 and Washington but

341. At the same time, however, SCS estimates there is a need for 6,503 additional ponds in Oregon and for 3,861 more in Washington.

The service also reported progress in its program for improved water application on farm lands in the two states. This includes the regulation and improvement of all types of irrigation.

In 1950, SCS technicians cooper-

ated in improving water application to 25,559 acres in Oregon and 13,604 acres in Washington. Last year they employed their services on 47,184 Oregon acres and on 101,386 acres in Washington.

The improved water application program to date covers 141,102 acres in Oregon and 309,946 acres in Washington. Land on which SCS officials estimate there still is need

for the program covers 778,137 acres and 574,099 acres in Oregon and Washington, respectively.

Oregon farmers last year consulted SCS also on leveling of 9,890 acres, largely for irrigation purposes. During the same period Washington farmers sought advice for leveling 21,346 acres. SCS officials estimate the leveling program still could be applied to 427-

007 acres in Oregon and 274,328 acres in Washington.
