Whisky, Gas, Auto Taxes Reach New U.S. Record

WASHINGTON (AP)—The public paid more federal taxes last year on whisky, gasoline and autos than in any previous fiscal year.

And the current year seems headed toward still another record, because of a July 1 increase in gasoline and other highway user taxes to finance the highway building program.

The Internal Revenue Service reported today that excise taxes yielded the government \$10,004,195,000 in the 1956 fiscal year ended June 30.

In that total, the service said, consumers paid record amounts on all types of alcoholic beverages and on gasoline.

Taxes on liquors at \$10.50 a gallon piled up to \$2,062,242,000—the first time the total ever went over the two billion mark.

PEAK YIELDS

Coupled with peak yields from levies on beer and wines, alcohol taxes brought in \$2,920,374,000. That was 123 million more than in fiscal 1954, the previous top year.

Gasoline taxes yielded a new high of \$1,030,397,000, about 75 million more than in fiscal 1955, the previous record year.

The booming sales of automobiles in the last half of 1955 helped to boost the excise tax return on vehicles to a record \$1,376,372,000.

Tobacco taxes, another big source of revenue, brought in \$1,613,497,000, but this was below the record set in fiscal 1953. Following controversial reports that certain types of cancer might be attributed to smoking, the tax total

declined in fiscal 1954 and 1955 but rose again last year. Of the 1956 figure, cigarette taxes brought in \$1,549,045,000, a gain of 45 million over the previous fiscal year.

The administration already has said it expects the excise taxes to yield about \$10,800,000,000 by next June 30. Thus, the 1957 fiscal year total would be pressing the record take of \$10,837,401,000 set in fiscal 1953.

BIG GAINS

Based on the big gain in gasoline sales the last fiscal year, the increase of one cent a gallon which went into effect July 1 should yield about 500 million dollar revenue. This increase together with higher taxes on tires, tubes, trucks and buses, to help pay for the big new road building program, may boost the excise total to a new high, one well placed source said.

Of the nearly 11 billion dollars the government expects to take this year from excise levies, about 1 1/2 billion will go into a trust fund to be used for highway construction. Thus the amount going into general funds of the treasury will run closer to 9 1/2 billion or considerably less than for the last fiscal year.

HOTEL BRISTLES WITH ARMS

CHICAGO (UP)—The Conrad Hilton Hotel bristled today with revolvers, tear gas bombs, weighted nightsticks and handcuffs. The small arsenal was on display for the 63rd annual conference of the International Association of Chiefs of Police.

Authorities To Question Crewman About Wreck

SPRINGER, N.M. (AP)—A train crewman was to be queried today at an inquest in Springer into the crash of a railway streamliner and a sideline mail train.

Twenty persons were killed and 35 were injured when the Santa Fe Chief slammed head-on into the waiting mail train in the pre-dawn hours yesterday.

Miraculously, the 312 passengers aboard the Chief escaped death.

A railway official said a Santa Fe workman threw a switch, turning the 13-car Chief onto a bypass where it smashed into the mail train which was waiting for it to pass.

The wreck was five miles south of here on rolling rangeland.

The railway spokesman, J. P. Reinhold, vice president in charge of public relations, said the Chief was traveling 40 to 45 m.p.h. when it rammed the mail train at 3 a.m.

The debris was cleared about 14 hours later just after the body of the 20th victim was found.

Officials identified the last victim as brakeman Lawrence McCormick, Raton, N.M., and said the body was found in the wreckage of a dormitory car on the Chief, where the victim was riding from Raton to Albuquerque.

The other dead also were railway workmen, either trainmen or dining car employes. Most were sleeping in the dormitory car.

Officials said the mail train fireman became confused and set the switch the wrong way after his train had pulled off the main line to let the Chief pass.

Reinhold said the fireman committed an "error in judgment" and the mistake was "just one of those things that is hard to figure out. He just does not know why he did it." The official identified the fireman as P. C. Caldarelli of Raton, who late last night still

was in a state of shock.

Reached by telephone at his Raton home, Caldarelli was asked how the error happened.

He answered, "I don't know."

"It was a great shock . . . They were my friends," he said. "I don't feel good."

He said he had been in bed all day after the accident and was given a sedative.

John B. Curtis, Associated Press writer at the scene, described the scrambled cars as "twisted and standing on end—a fantastic accident."
