ADELAIDE, Australia — Britain's first airdropped atomic bomb will be exploded in tests beginning at dawn next Tuesday if the weather permits. The blast will take place at Maralinga, in the "dead heart" of Australia, 700 miles from this south Australian capital. The tests will also include two bursts from towers and one ground explosion.

Low Market Told By Coon

BAKER—A sagging lumber market in the Northwest was brought to the attention of President Eisenhower in a letter sent from here Wednesday by Rep. Sam Coon (R. Ore).

Coon earlier had written to Treasury Secretary Humphrey about the matter. He said that lumbermen are blaming the condition on a lag in home construction caused by tight credit.

The Congressman told the President that considerable unemployment may result if the mills are forced to cut down on production or shut down completely.

During his recent campaign trip through central and Southern Oregon, Coon visited a number of lumber mills, and said that many of the lumbermen expressed concern over decreasing lumber orders.

In his letter to the President, Coon said that he was bringing the matter to his attention because of its "impact on an industry so vital to our economy."

Government May Make Charges

PORTLAND — The federal government is considering possible charges because of the much-publicized tape recordings seized by police here in vice investigations.

The recordings, allegedly made by phone taps, were seized by sheriff's deputies at the Portland residence of Raymond F. Clark, Clark and his employer, James B. Elkins, were indicted by a county grand jury on phone-tap charges earlier. Subsequently both were indicted by a grand jury investigating vice conditions.

The FBI took over the tapes from state police Wednesday, and federal Dist. Atty. C. E. Luckey said federal charges might result.

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
