

Seventh Annual Bench Show Held By Fanciers

A Saint Bernard, Sanctuary Woods Palawan, owned by Mary Grigsby, was judged winner of the local class at the seventh annual bench show sponsored by Klamath Dog Fanciers, Inc., held last Saturday.

Three hundred and fifty-three dogs were shown during the morning and afternoon judging and California dogs walked away with most of the honors. Judges were Percy Roberts, Milford, Connecticut; Chris Shuttleworth, Sun Valley, California; and Vincent Perry of Van Nuys. Dogs were entered from California, Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana, according to Betty J. Allen, secretary-treasurer of the Dog Fanciers.

A whippet, Champion Canyon Crest's Teardrop, from Canyon Crest Kennels in Beverly Hills, won top in the hound breeds and was judged best in show.

SPORTING BREEDS

Sporting breeds was won by a back cocker, Champion Gail's Ebony Don D., owned by Mr. and Mrs. Roy O. Nelson, Palo Alto, California.

The only Old English sheepdog entered, Mr. Zip of Delenere, owned by Mr. and Mrs. D. G. Phillips of Covena, California, won in working breeds. Eight different breeds were entered including 22 Boxers.

A Kerry blue terrier, Champion

Viken's Showoff, owned by Kerry-all Kennels, San Francisco, won terrier breeds.

Champion Shauglin Sing Lee, a Pekingese owned by Mrs. Adolph A. Rutschaupt of Fresno, won toy breeds.

A Boston terrier, International Champion Chappie's Regards, owned by John T. Robinson of San Bruno, won non-sporting breeds.

This was the first year a local class has been held. In addition to Mrs. Grigsby's Saint, other winners were a Chihuahua, Ledesma's Jesuita, owned by Juanita Ledesma, taking winners bitch and best opposite; Ledesma Chico, same owner, reserve winners male, and 6-year-old Georgina McDonald's colie, Kay-Mac's Rosie O'Grady, which took reserve winners bitch in a class of five.

After the show a buffet supper was served to guests which included Mrs. Helen Maring of Portland, superintendent of the show; stewards, judges, Klamath Dog Fanciers members and their families. Approximately 40 persons attended.

MORE POPULAR

"Dogs were noticeably more popular this year than previously," Mrs. Allen commented. "There were five Samoyeds compared with 25 last year and seven collies compared with 18 last year. The total number of dogs entered was only slightly under last year's figure."

One professional handler who attended the show brought his dogs from California in an air conditioned bus from which the seats had been removed and individual cages installed. He was Harold Sangster, who was named Handler of the Year in 1954. In all, nearly 25 professional handlers attended the show.

Dog Fanciers, Inc., is a non-profit organization and the net amount made on each show goes to worthy projects. Part of the fund goes to Klamath Union High School. One year it was to help with expenses to the East and West game and last year money went toward the purchase of new uniforms. The other portion of the money goes to Guide Dogs for the Blind, earmarked for future use when the need arises for a Guide Dog for some Klamath Falls person. Each of the last two years, a total of about \$450 was donated to the two projects. A report on this year's donations will not be available until all of the accounts are in.

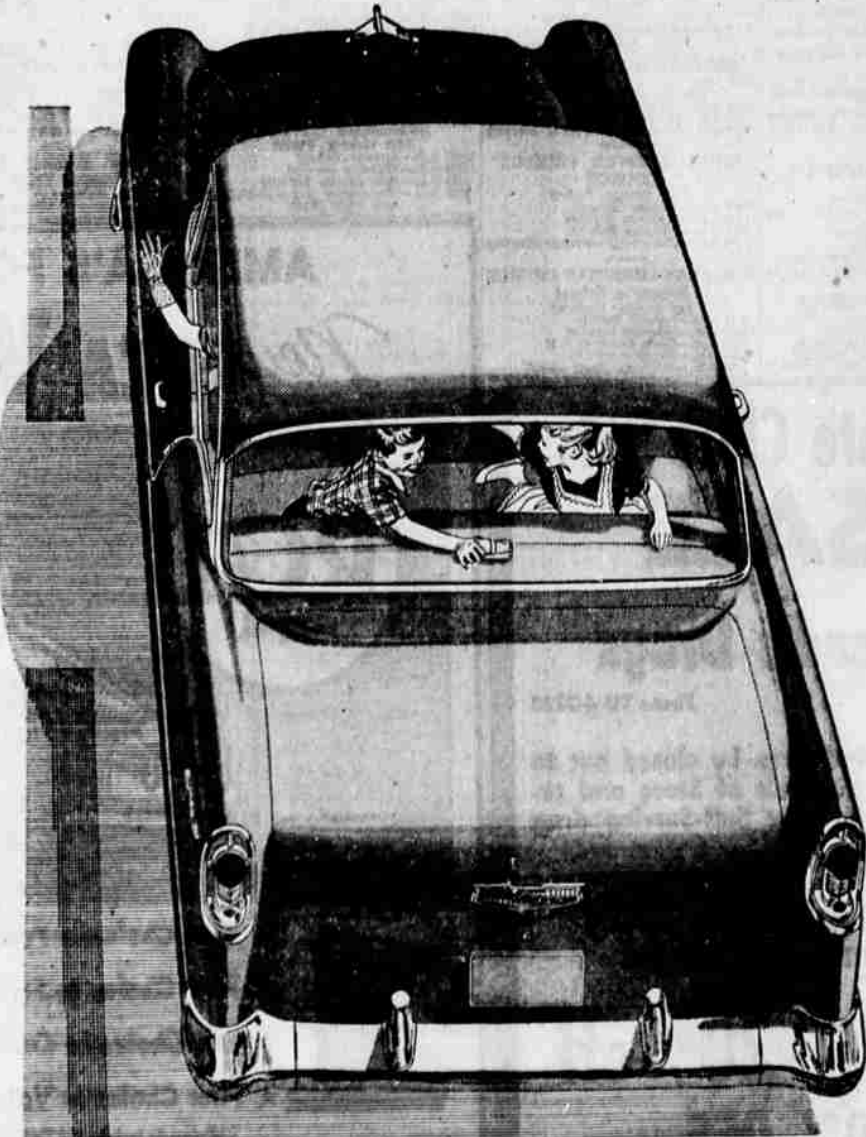
