

SEGREGATION ROWS QUIETING

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Guardsmen
On Duty In
Two States

Sturgis, Ky., turned from violence to boycott today to express its dislike for integration of its high school.

But trouble popped up anew at Texarkana, Tex., where a line was drawn on the sidewalk in front of the all-white junior college, with these words written beside it: "The nigger who crosses this line will die."

Two Negroes who had planned to enter the college were turned back by a jeering crowd. There were no injuries.

Integration of schools in Louisville, Ky., was completed today with no incident except picketing of the city Board of Education offices by representatives of the Kentucky White Citizens Council.

An estimated 12,000 of the Louisville city-county student enrollment of 82,000 are Negro.

For the first time in a week there was no racial violence in any of the South's critical school integration spots today. Negro children attended classes in peace at Sturgis and Clinton, Tenn., but National Guardsmen still were on duty at both places.

The victory for integration at Sturgis was not complete. When seven Negro children arrived, under State Police escort, they found themselves almost alone in school. Only a few white pupils showed up.

A good humored crowd of between 500 and 600 persons had gathered outside the school building by midmorning. There were no incidents in the first hours of the new school day.

At Clay, Ky., 11 miles south of Sturgis, Mrs. James Gordon, a Negro mother, made no attempt today to enroll her two children after a crowd of some 200 white persons gathered at the school. No State Police were on hand, a condition the parent had placed on plans to enter her children.

Three Negro children tried without success to enroll at a Houston, Tex., elementary school today.

Although a number of Texas schools are integrated, the principal said "we are not allowed to accept these pupils." Their sponsor, NAACP representative George Nelson, left without further efforts. A white man attempted to strike him on the school grounds.

At White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., where the Southern governors conference is in session, Tennessee Gov. Frank G. Clement urged fellow governors to keep both "outside agitators" and the federal government out of the school integration problem.

Clement said he was faced with a "terrible decision" in calling out the National Guard when violence erupted at Clinton, Tenn., over integration.

"But if I had waited another 30 minutes some of our citizens would have been lying dead in the streets," he said.

Boy Drowned In City Reservoir

PORTLAND — A boy attempting to retrieve arrows floating in a city reservoir drowned Saturday.

Tommy Miller, 9, and a playmate saw the arrows in the lower reservoir at Washington Park. They climbed the high fence surrounding the reservoir and Tommy lost his footing on the slippery, sloping side. The companion ran for help but Tommy had gone to the bottom by the time a policeman arrived.

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Bing Crosby Denies Tale

HOLLYWOOD — Bing Crosby said Monday it was news to him that he had asked for and received a baptismal certificate, a Catholic church practice that would indicate he planned marriage.

Reached by phone at his Hayden Lake, Idaho, summer home, the crooner commented:

"I don't know anything about it."

His comment came after he was read a Tacoma story which stated that an unidentified Catholic priest there said Crosby had requested and received his baptismal certificate.

Bing was born in Tacoma in 1904.

Over the weekend, the Hollywood rumor mill buzzed with reports that Bing planned to marry actress Kathy Grant, for two years his one and only girl friend. The pretty Texan is 24.

Only recently, she became a convert to Catholicism.

Bing said he was sorry "but I have no news about getting married." He added that he was still denying all marriage rumors.

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Typhoon On
Rampage In
Japan Area

TOKYO (UP) — Typhoon Emma whirled across the Japan sea toward Siberia today with 115-mile per hour winds, leaving a swath of destruction in Japan, Korea and Okinawa. Fantastic rainfalls up to 32 inches and accompanying floods added to the disaster.

The typhoon, rampaging far north of its tropical breeding ground, killed 19 persons in a glancing blow at southwest Japan and injured 93. Wind and floods destroyed hundreds of houses and left 6,134 persons homeless.

One American soldier and two Okinawan civilians were reported killed when Emma struck there with full fury. U.S. authorities announced 8,466 buildings were destroyed or badly damaged and thousands homeless. Damage was in the millions.

Reports from Korea were incomplete. Communications were crippled and there was no immediate word on the damage done to the hundreds of thousands of war refugees living in flimsy shacks in such cities as Pusan which was sideswiped.

The U.S. Itazuke Air Base in Kyushu reported 120 buildings damaged, several roofs blown off but no casualties or damage to aircraft.

A mountain village in Shikoku Island recorded "over 32 inches" of rain. Another "over 28 inches."

The typhoon drove through the Tsushima Straits between Japan and South Korea this morning, sparing both countries the full force of its deadly winds. It was moving northward at 45 miles an hour toward Siberia and the northern island of Hokkaido.

The course was the same as that taken by a typhoon two years ago which caught ferriesboats between Honshu and Hokkaido and killed 1,500 persons in minutes.

Heavy Vote Predicted In
Maine's Balloting Today

PORTLAND, Maine — Heavy voting is expected today in a Maine election the Republicans claim will spur the nation into reelecting President Eisenhower in November. Democrats say the issue is not Eisenhower but continuance of a semblance of two-party government in Maine.

The Republicans are trying to recapture the governorship from Edmund S. Muskie, first Democrat to hold the office in 20 years, and hold the state's three U.S. House seats.

If Muskie, 42, beats House Speaker Willis A. Trafton Jr., 37, he will be the second Democratic governor to be reelected since the Civil War.

Two of the state's leading political writers have given the nod to the tall, curly-haired governor. They also see the three Republican congressmen as victors.

One of these writers, Peter M. Damberg of the Guy Gannett papers, looks for a 300,000 turnout — only 10,000 off the gubernatorial record set in 1936. There are about 500,000 eligible voters this year.

Two GOP congressmen are opposed by the Democrats they beat two years ago. They are Representatives Robert Hale, 56, seeking an eighth term in the 1st Dist. against James G. Oliver, 60, and Clifford G. McIntire, 48, of the 3rd Dist. whose third-term foe is Kenneth B. Colbath (D), 57.

Fighting for the 2nd Dist. seat of retiring Rep. Charles P. Nelson (R) are State Sen. James L. Reid, 48, and Frank M. Coffin, 37-year-old chairman of the Democratic State Committee.

The big question in the race for the governorship is: How many of the so-called "Muskie Republicans" of 1954 will stick with him this time?

Two years ago Muskie defeated the Republican incumbent, Burton M. Cross, by a vote of 135,673 to 113,298—or 54½ per cent of a total vote just under 249,000.

With only about 99,000 registered Democrats at the time, it was obvious Muskie had the support of a lot of Republicans.

Storm Spotter
Plane Missing

TOKYO — A U. S. RB50 weather reconnaissance plane with 16 crewmen aboard was reported missing Monday night. It failed to return from a typhoon-spotting mission in the Japan Sea between Japan and Russia, the Air Force said.

The plane was last heard from 200 miles northwest of Niigata, Japan.

The big four-engine weather version of the B50 bomber carried 15 officers and 10 airmen on its mission to assist in gathering data on typhoon Emma. The typhoon late Monday headed up the east coast of Soviet Siberia.

The RB50's last position was roughly halfway between the coasts of northern Japan and eastern Siberia.

The big plane "had sufficient fuel to keep it in flight until 9:30 p.m. (4:30 a.m. PST). It was listed as overdue when it didn't land at that time" at its home base, Yokota, near Tokyo, the Air Force said. An hour later, it was listed as missing.

Typhoon fringe winds over 50 m.p.h. and heavy rain whipped the Japan Sea, but other American planes commenced a night-long search "in the hope of sighting signal flares," the announcement said.

"Additional aircraft will join the search at daybreak," the Air Force added. "U. S. Navy and other surface ships are also searching the area for the missing plane and members of its crew."

Fair Skies For Desert Pledged

PORTLAND — Fair skies in Oregon for the next day or so will be found mostly in the eastern part of the state, the Weather Bureau reported Monday.

Rain, which fell heavily along the coast Sunday, totaling more than an inch for the day at some points, was expected intermittently west of the Cascades through much of the week.

Eastern Oregon, getting some scattered showers in mountain areas, will have "considerable" sunshine between periods of cloudiness, the forecast said.

The Sunday rain in Portland was the first measurable rain in the city since Aug. 27.

Survey On
Sewage Made

A survey of the drainage and sewage needs of the Klamath Falls south suburban area is now underway by the firm of Cornell, Howland, Hayes and Merryfield, Corvallis engineering consulting company, reported Klamath County Sanitation Max Braden today.

The engineering firm was retained this summer by the Klamath County Court to make the study of the drainage, sewer and sewage disposal needs of the south suburban area. The court appropriated \$4,200 in this year's county budget for the survey following a request from residents of the area. Dr. Seth Kerron, county health officer, and Braden.

The survey is expected to be completed by October 1. When the data is compiled by the engineers a comprehensive report and recommendations will be made by them. Following receipt of this report by the county court, a public hearing will be held for all interested persons, Braden said.

PEACE PLAN

TOKYO — Russia was reported Monday to have informed Japan informally that she would accept a five-point peace settlement under discussion here.

The plan calls for termination of the technical state of war, an exchange of ambassadors, the immediate return of Japanese prisoners, putting the Japan-Soviet fisheries agreement into operation and for Russian cooperation in getting Japan into the United Nations.

VISIT

NAPLES, Italy — King Paul and Queen Frederika of Greece arrived here Monday aboard the Greek Navy destroyer "Hella," for a brief private visit to Italy.

CONFERENCE

BONN, Germany — U. S. Air Force Secretary Donald A. Quarles conferred Monday with Chancellor Konrad Adenauer on the buildup of the new West German armed forces. Quarles, on a 17-day tour of air bases in Europe and North Africa, will fly to Rome Tuesday.

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
