

FORCE READIED AGAINST EGYPT

Tulelake Repayment Contract Signing Revealed By Manager

M. K. Strantz, manager of the Tulelake Irrigation District, telephoned the Herald and News this morning that the Tulelake repayment contract has been signed by Sam Anderson, president of TID, and C. H. Spencer, regional director of the Bureau of Reclamation.

Anderson and Spencer both hailed the signing of the controversial repayment contract as the opening of a new phase in the development of the Klamath project.

Anderson stated that the water users will be happy to be paying off their obligation to the United States. He said that the district was glad to be getting at last into the business it was organized to do.

Stating that the operation of the system and the collection of construction charges was the purpose for which the district was organized, he said:

"Now that we have demonstrated our good faith in giving up part of the lease revenues to permit the further development of the land in our district, we want to do our part in seeing more private farming in the area."

Spencer noted that it had been 34 years since the land was first opened to public entry on September 29, 1922, and mentioned the amount and manner of payment of construction charges had been in controversy since that time. Spencer also noted that the Bureau

was following Congressional direction going back nearly 34 years in moving out of the operation business on the first of January, 1957.

Spencer stated that this Tulelake repayment contract was one of the three or four knotty problems left in his lap when he took over in July, 1953.

Southern Race Riots Soften Up

Racial tension eased at Sturgis, Ky., and Clinton, Tenn., Tuesday and newly integrated classes showed an increase of attendance by white students in both towns.

In Sturgis, seven Negroes returned to classes at Sturgis High School and white attendance rose from about 50 to 250. The white enrollment is 310. There was no demonstration by the 65 persons gathered in front of the school as the Negro students arrived. Two companies of National Guardsmen were present.

Two ENROLLED
In nearby Clay, Ky., two Negro children were enrolled in an all-Negro school, ending a disturbance resulting from efforts to send the two to the all-white school in Clay. Some 75 Clay residents had gathered outside the school where a similar crowd turned the Negroes away Monday.

In Clinton, Tenn., white student attendance at the high school rose to 500 and 11 of 12 Negroes were in class. A week ago only 266 white pupils were in the school after anti-integration disorders.

D. J. Brittain Jr., Clinton principal, said 36 white pupils have transferred to other schools. This leaves total enrollment at 770.

BOYCOTT FADES
A boycott of four Mercer County schools in West Virginia lost much of its steam. At Mataoka High School where 29 Negroes are enrolled, white attendance rose to 433 out of an enrollment of 614. The Mataoka Elementary School reported 290 of its 341 pupils present.

In the Springfield, W.Va., elementary and junior high schools attendance totaled 236 with only 48 absent and the Arista Elementary School reported 38 pupils out of an enrollment of 60.

The group of 65 persons outside the Sturgis, Ky., High School Tuesday contrasted to the noisy crowd of between 600 and 1,000 persons in front of the school Monday. Some in the crowd said the white pupils would never come back.

Names of the six officers and 10 crewmen aboard were made public Tuesday. None lived in the Pacific Northwest.

SALEM — Search for four escaped Linn County jail prisoners continued on the Oregon Coast Tuesday.

State Police Capt. Ray Howard said, however, that his officers haven't developed any leads since the prisoners' abandoned stolen car was found Monday morning at Independence.

The men, all potential life-termers, escaped from the jail at Albany Friday night.

Two of them, James Earl Bonney, 35, and Ernest L. Gibson, 29, were identified as having entered a tavern at Siletz Sunday night.

Police are theorizing that the men rode a logging train from Independence to Valse, and then made their way by car from Valse to Siletz.

The other two men are James Arthur Patton, 39, and Dan C. Ott, 45.

AF Weather Plane Sought

TOKYO — Skies cleared Tuesday over the typhoon-whipped waters of the Japan sea, but search planes and ships still reported no trace of an American weather-scouting plane that disappeared at the height of the storm's fury.

Sixteen U.S. Air Force men were aboard the missing plane, sent out Monday to measure wind velocity and air pressure inside Typhoon Emma, a killer storm that took 35 lives and caused millions of dollars damage in Japan, Okinawa, South Korea and the Philippines.

The four-engine RB30, a reconnaissance version of the Air Force B50 bomber, was last heard from halfway between the coasts of Japan and Soviet Siberia.

"It is presumed down in the Sea of Japan, but the searchers so far have found nothing," a U.S. Air Force spokesman said. "The weather is clear, but the sea still is so rough it is difficult to spot anything."

Thirty U.S. planes based in Japan scoured 70,000 square miles of sea Tuesday in search of wreckage or life rafts. Several planes and 10 Japanese surface ships continued the hunt Tuesday night.

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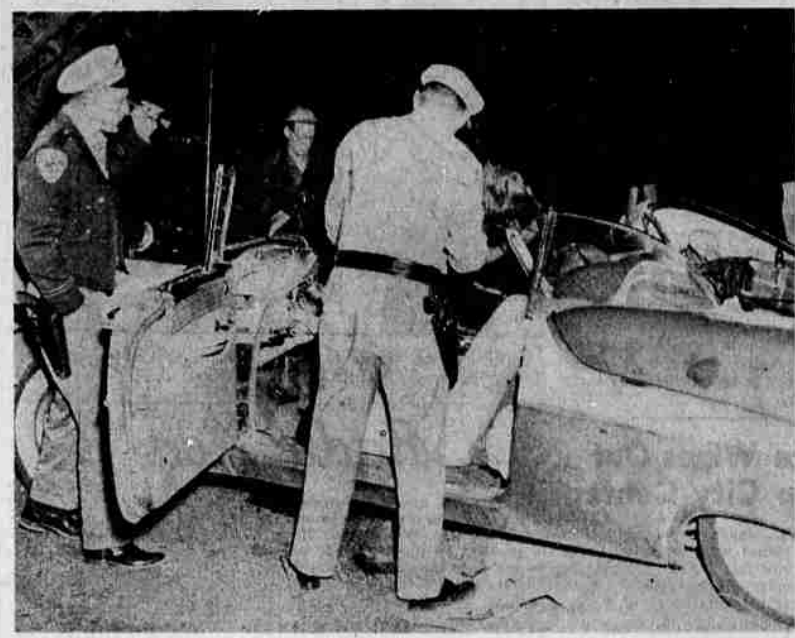

Search Begins For Boatmen

COOS BAY — A Coast Guard cutter plowed through the seas south of the Coos Bay entrance Tuesday, while a plane from the Port Angeles Coast Guard station searched from overhead for an 18-foot outboard boat from Roseburg missing with three aboard.

The boat, owned by Edward J. Plooff of Route 1, Roseburg, put out from Charleston, southwest of here, Sunday on a fishing trip.

A search Monday, in the bay and outside the bar, was fruitless. With Plooff were a man and a woman reported to be Albert Gnath or Gnath and Lora Lee Gnath or Gnath. Their address was not known to police or the Coast Guard. They were not listed in Roseburg directories.

The boat was named the Diane E.

The cutter continued its search through Monday night while the plane spent the night at Eugene, then took off again Tuesday morning.

Plane Protest Sent To Reds

WASHINGTON — The United States has sent a formal note to Red China which "strongly protests" the shooting down of an American Navy plane off the China Coast Aug. 23.

The American note, sent through the British embassy in Peking, served notice that Red China will be asked to "pay all damages" including compensation for the loss of the 16 crewmen as well as the aircraft.

The shooting down of the plane by Red fighters was denounced as "without warning" and "unjustified."

Alturas Youth Perishes In Truck-Auto Accident

TULELAKE — A collision between a 1955 hardtop automobile and a parked grain truck took the life last night about 8 p.m. of an Alturas man and put his brother in Klamath Valley Hospital, Klamath Falls, for treatment of head injuries.

Dead is Will Worth Hatfield, 19, of Alturas. Injured was the driver of the car, U. A. Hatfield, 21. Both men are sons of Mr. and Mrs. Jasper James Hatfield, of Alturas.

Investigating officers, F. A. Dobson, Siskiyou County coroner, Bill Skelton, and V. Winkelman, California State Highway patrolmen, said that the driver was blinded by bright lights of an oncoming car and drove into the rear of the loaded truck.

The three-ton truck was parked without warning flares three miles west of California State Highway 139 on the state line road according to investigating officers. No driver was present. The name of Verland Huff was in the cab.

The men, missionaries at large were en route home to Alturas at the time of the accident.

Surviving are Hatfield's parents Mr. and Mrs. Jasper James Hatfield, Alturas; three brothers, U. A. Hatfield, Charles J. Hatfield and James J. Hatfield, all of Alturas, and one sister, Mrs. Lloyd Edgar of Santa Ana, California.

The body was taken to O'Hair's Memorial Chapel in Klamath Falls. Funeral services will be held in the chapel at 2 p.m. Thursday, September 13. Final rites and interment will be in the Porterville Cemetery, Porterville, California.

Two other traffic accidents over the weekend resulted in injuries for residents of Tulelake.

James Woodman, 30, is a patient in a Klamath Falls hospital following collision with a deer Saturday night in the Lava Beds National Monument. Woodman is reported to have suffered a broken back and several broken ribs.

With James E. (Bud) O'Brien, editor of the Tulelake Reporter and James Justis, both of Tulelake, Woodman was a passenger in a pickup truck that was being driven from the area following a deer hunting trip. About four miles north of the ranger station, a deer jumped in front of the pickup, resulting in the vehicle being overturned. Both Woodman and O'Brien were injured and stayed at the scene while Justis walked 12 miles to a telephone to report the accident. Justis was treated for minor injuries.

The third accident resulted in injuries for Yvette Chisolm, 15, driver of a car that investigating officers said sped out of control and hit the abutment of a bridge on the state line road on Sunday evening. John Paris, passenger in the car received superficial hurts.

Inland temperatures have cooled and frost is possible in Central Oregon, the Klamath Basin and in Eastern Oregon, the forecasters added.

Thunderstorms, which ranged over much of the Pacific Northwest Tuesday, are expected to strike scattered localities again.

Wet snow is a possibility at Timberline Lodge and other points above 6,000 feet in the northern Cascades, forecasters said.

A wide variety of weather, mostly unpleasant, is on tap for Oregon. It ranges from frost in Eastern Oregon, thunderstorms and possible snow in the mountains, to rain in Western Oregon and elsewhere.

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Britain May Take Suez Issue To UN

LONDON — Britain and France warned Egypt Tuesday they are ready to use force if necessary to protect their rights in the Suez Canal.

A high political source said, however, Britain would lay the Suez dispute before the United Nations as the next step toward a solution.

A communique issued by British

Prime Minister Eden and French Premier Guy Mollet said they are determined "to resist by all appropriate means any arbitrary interference with rights under international agreements" in the Suez crisis.

Winding up two days of emergency talks, they declared themselves in full agreement on "further measures to be taken" in the light of Egypt's refusal to negotiate an international system for operating the 103-mile canal.

These "further measures" were not spelled out.

A Foreign Office spokesman said, however, the measures will be disclosed in the British House of Commons, which meets in emergency session Wednesday and Thursday.

DECISION
Just before the communique was issued a high British political informant said the Eden government had definitely decided to place the Suez dispute before the United Nations, but was still considering in what form this should be done.

Britain and France have been steadily building up their land, air and sea power in the eastern Mediterranean, within striking distance of the Suez Canal. Britain has granted France military facilities on Cyprus.

But both nations have expressed a desire for a peaceful settlement. Mollet and Eden began their talks Monday night in the light of Egyptian President Nasser's refusal to negotiate on an 18-nation plan to put the Suez Canal under international control.

The communique said they agreed that "the refusal of President Nasser to negotiate on this basis created a very grave situation."

NEW PLAN EYED
They also discussed Nasser's sudden new proposal Monday to set up an international negotiating body to seek a peaceful solution. The Foreign Office spokesman said Eden and Mollet "did not regard the Egyptian proposals as a contribution to an acceptable settlement."

In Cairo, the Egyptian-controlled Middle East News Agency reported the Arab League's Political Committee will meet next Monday to discuss the Egyptian proposal for a canal users' conference.

In Rome, informed sources reported the U.S. 6th Fleet would be available to evacuate Americans from Egypt if any deterioration in the Suez situation made that necessary.

Three possible ways of putting the Suez issue before the U. N. were reported being considered:

1. Merely acquainting the Security Council with the dispute.

2. Presenting the controversy as a threat to peace.

3. Demanding condemnation of Egypt for nationalizing the canal.

British Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd, who sat by Eden's side in the talks with Mollet, was said to be ready to fly to New York to present the case to the U.N.

Shoat Webster, winner of the Round-Up's all around title four years in a row from 1949 through 1952, also has entered and so has the long-time favorite here, Ike Rude.

Rude, despite his age, recently won first prize money in the Cheyenne Frontier Days steer roping.

There will be no Saturday night show in the arena, each of the four cowboy competitions starting at 1:15 p. m.

The Happy Canyon pageant will be presented each of the four evenings.

Guest Perishes In Hotel Fire

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. — Fire swept through 14 rooms of the Seminole Hotel in downtown Jacksonville last night, and one guest died—apparently of a heart attack—in the excitement.

Deputy Fire Chief J. J. Harvey blamed "smoking in bed" for the blaze, which broke out on the eighth floor of the 10-story structure about 9:30 p. m.

The fire was quickly controlled about 170 guests of the 240-room hotel were evacuated—some on firemen's ladders.

Several persons required first aid for smoke and cuts from broken glass.

James Demos, 70, a long-time resident of the hotel, was the heart attack victim.

William M. Nolting, hotel manager, estimated damage at \$20,000.
