CHICAGO (UP) — Wheat crept up toward the finish on the Board of Trade Tuesday, wiping out early losses and posting gains.

The firming trend in wheat imparted some strength to other cereals. Toward the finish they, too, began to creep higher. They weren't as strong as wheat, however.

Wheat finally responded to news of heavy importations of 1956 crop wheat under the government loan and announcement the Export-Import Bank would help move American farm surpluses abroad.

Former FDR Aide Passes

WASHINGTON (UP) — Homer S. Cummings, who fought many of the New Deal's legal battles, is dead at the age of 86.

The death yesterday of President Franklin D. Roosevelt's first attorney general was attributed to heart failure. He left only a grandson, Schuyler Cummings of Miami, Fla.

Cummings had been in private law practice since retiring from the Roosevelt Cabinet 17 years ago. The long-time Democrat is remembered for his part in the Roosevelt administration's unsuccessful fight to put across legislation to empower the President to name one new Supreme Court justice for each sitting member over age 70. Authorship of this plan, derided by its foes as a "court packing" scheme, was credited to Cummings.

For about 40 years Cummings was active in Democratic party affairs, serving for a quarter century as national committeeman from Connecticut. Last night, Democratic National Chairman Paul M. Butler praised him for serving "his country notably throughout his illustrious career."

Born in Chicago, Cummings was educated at Yale and remained in Connecticut until he entered the Roosevelt Cabinet. Since his retirement from the government in 1939, he had spent most of his time here. His fourth wife, Julia, died last year.

Funeral services were planned tentatively for tomorrow.

Benson Asks Wheat Policy

CHICAGO (UP) — Secretary of Agriculture Benson said today it is the "philosophy" of the Eisenhower administration to get the government out of the business of storing grain.

With grain surpluses declining, he said, the time is coming when a decision must be made regarding use of government storage facilities with a capacity of a billion bushels.

"Now let me say this very plainly: our philosophy is that government should get out of the storage business as soon, and as far, as it is feasible to do so," Benson said in a speech prepared for a meeting of the Grain and Feed Dealers National Assn.

"When the need for government-owned storage facilities declines, then it is our philosophy that government should reduce its ownership of such facilities," Benson said. "Government should not be in business in competition with its tax-paying citizens."

Government ownership of storage facilities was an issue in the 1948 presidential campaign and has bobbed up in several elections since that time.

Benson called on the grain trade for help in slowing down forces which he said are trying to push the government into greater control over agriculture.

"In our own generation, we have seen government move in and take over in the name of economic security—and nobody knows it more than you," he said.

"Never before have so many people been inclined to look to government to call the signals. The most serious threat to the private marketing of grain has become the government itself. The federal government has been burdened with the greatest hoard of farm products ever gathered."

Bank Loses Million Note

NEW YORK (UP) — The Chase Manhattan Bank's missing million dollar banknote will have to stay missing, the bank reluctantly decided Monday.

Officials of the bank called off a six-month search for the Treasury note which had been turned over to Chase Manhattan for safekeeping by a smaller bank.

When the smaller bank asked for its money back on March 6, a Chase employee went to the drawer where it had been filed away on Feb. 8. It was gone.

A feverish search followed. More than 150 bank employees turned Chase Manhattan upside down. They rifled through stacks of paper, peered into filing cabinets, poked into wastebaskets. Still no million dollar Treasury note.

The quest cost Chase Manhattan thousands of dollars and the bank was actually the only party to lose money as the Treasury note is non-negotiable. The Treasury Department eventually will reimburse the smaller bank.

A bachelor, Conforti was a member of a large family in Mount Shasta. He was employed by the Ralph Smith Lumber company. A native of California, he was born March 4, 1904.

Mass will be said in St. Anthony's Catholic Church on Wednesday morning at 10 a.m. and burial will be in the Mount Shasta Cemetery. Father Francis Sullivan of Weed will officiate.

While sheriff, Chandler figured in several sensational cases, including the Brights case in which two deputies and a civilian were killed by members of a desperate holdup gang.

It was also during his term of office that Siskiyou County's last lynching occurred. Spurred on by the killing of a deputy sheriff at Dunsmuir, a mob took the alleged murderer from the county jail and hanged him at a spot near the present location of Sharp's Mill.
