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KUHS School Directors Study Speakers Proposal

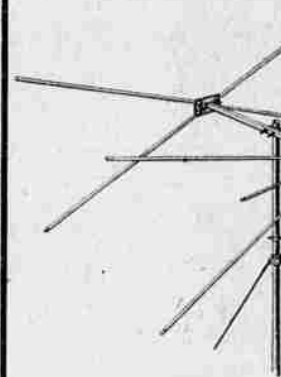

Relating the caliber of some of the speakers recently addressing teachers at the Klamath-Lake County Institute, board member Fred Hoagland, suggested that it would be a wonderful educational aid if similar type speakers could talk with the student body.

"We could get qualified speakers from outside and we could also make ourselves available to the qualified speakers we have right here in the Basin," Hoagland added. "We have a lot of smart men and able speakers around here."

Other action taken by the boards of District 1 and District 2, and the joint boards, included:

1. The directors scheduled a discussion of teacher sick leave programs at the next meeting.
2. Advanced the daily substitute teacher pay scale to correspond with the appropriate pro-rated amount of the annual salaries of full time teachers.
3. Approved the hiring of two part time students to work under the supervision of J. V. LaClair

when maintaining and repairing audio visual aid department equipment.

4. Awarded the damage and liability insurance policy of the school districts to Frank Hovey, representing the Truckers Insurance Exchange group.

5. Established a definite policy relative to the tuition to be paid for attending students who do not live within the school districts.

6. Approved minor modifications in the current rebuilding program at the natatorium.

7. Approved participation of the KUHS band in the junior chamber of commerce sponsored parade this weekend.

8. Approved the progress payment on the Ponderosa School.

9. Discussed the possibility of requesting one side parking on Fremont Street where it bounds Roosevelt School.

10. Re-established the school policy designed to keep school sponsored student activities from interfering with the Wednesday night church activities for students.

11. Approved the full year hiring of Oleta Johnson at Mills School, along with the part year hiring of Dorris Hines at the junior high school, Lillian Stenberg at Pelican School, Anna Fisher at Mills School and May Phinney at Fairview School.

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
