CHICAGO — Prime steers hit another new high in nearly 18 months in active dealings Wednesday.
The top was \$33.50, paid for a few loads of prime 1,250 to 1,425 pound steers. That was 75 cents above the previous 1955 high.
In active dealing prime steers sold steady to 75 cents higher. Other steers ranged from 50 cents lower to 50 cents higher, the poorer grades showing weakness.
Several loads of prime steers moved at \$32.25 to \$33.00. Most choice and prime brought \$28.00 to \$32.00 and good to low choice \$21.00 to \$25.50. Prime heifers topped at \$29.00.
Hogs sold steady to 25 cents lower in slow dealings. Buyers paid \$14.75 to \$15.50 for 170 to 190 pound butchers, \$15.50 to \$16.50, the top, for 200 to 230 pounders.
Spring lambs were steady to strong at \$20.50 to \$24.00 for good to prime.
Salable receipts were 9,500 hogs, 18,000 cattle, 300 calves and 1,300 sheep.
