

Chiloquin Opens School Year In New Structure

CHILOQUIN — The 1956 school year opened last week at Chiloquin, with grade school teachers and students using the new \$240,000 twelve classroom school with its cafeteria, gym, and spacious storage and playground facilities. Principal Frank Hale reported a change in the distribution of classes between the grade and high school building.

Originally, Chiloquin had eight grades in one building, four in the other. Nearly 20 years ago the system was changed so that there were six grades in each but this year the seventh grade has been divided. The straight seventh is in the grade school building but a combination seventh and eighth grade room is in the high school.

Enrollment figures show 227 students in the lower six grades, 20 more than at the end of the first week last year, 81 in the seventh and eighth, five more than in 1955, and 106 in the upper four grades, an increase of nine over first week registration last year. However, last year had a small-

One Killed In Crash

Bakersfield (UP) — One man was killed but another miraculously escaped injury Wednesday night when a dynamite-laden truck collided head-on with a car and then caught fire and exploded.

The dead man was identified as Herbert F. Shields, 55, Bakersfield, who was driving alone in the car. Walter Rosenbaum, driving the truck owned by the Trojan Powder Co. of San Francisco, escaped from the wreckage before the explosion.

The Highway Patrol said the collision occurred when the car, westbound on U. S. 466, pulled out to pass a stalled vehicle and smashed into the eastbound truck at Sandcut, some 10 miles east of here.

The truck reportedly was reduced to molten metal after exploding and set fire to roadside brush which burned over four acres before being contained by fire units.

Every available unit of the patrol, the Kern County sheriff's office and fire department was sent to the crash scene. The highway was blocked off on both sides of the collision and traffic was diverted for more than an hour.

Youths Attend Safety Course

DUNSMUIR — Twenty-five youngsters are attending a two-week hunter safety course at the Dunsmuir Elementary School this week and next. The initial meeting being Monday, Harry Bender, Glen Minuth, Dick Brunjes and James Lambert are instructors.

The course is limited to 12 years and older so that as many as possible may qualify for junior hunting licenses this year. A certification of completion is necessary before a hunting license will be issued to a minor. Parental permission was required for the course.

GOP Faces Vote Setback

Three major battles appeared in the closing after nearly complete primary election returns Thursday emphasized a prestige setback to the Republicans in the statewide political races.

They are: (1) the race for governor between Lt. Gov. Emmett Anderson, Republican, and State Sen. Albert Rosellini, the Democratic nominee, after both scored surprisingly one-sided primary victories;

(2) Gov. Langlie's attempt to gain ground on Sen. Magnuson for the latter's Senate seat. Magnuson's "popularity contest" vote total climbed 150,000 above the Republican governor's;

(3) The run-off race between Mrs. Pearl Wamamaker and Lloyd Andrews of Spokane for Mrs. Wamamaker's long-time post of superintendent of public instruction. She ran up a margin of only about 4,000 over Andrews but the combined total of her two opponents was about 112,000 above the vote she drew in the nonpartisan race.
