

Deadlocked Jury Panel Dismissed

EUGENE, O. — A deadlocked jury was dismissed Wednesday night after reaching no decision in the first trial of Ernest Lundeen. Eugene attorney under indictment on two separate charges involving financial dealings with two clients.

While the jury was still out Circuit Judge Dal M. King of Coos County opened Lundeen's trial on the second charge.

The first trial was on a charge of receiving money stolen in a food market robbery. Lundeen, 34, will be re-tried on this charge, probably after the new court term begins Oct. 1.

As the trial on the second charge—larceny by bailee, or embezzlement—began Wednesday afternoon, Robert Anderson, assistant attorney general, said the prosecution would attempt to prove that Lundeen defaulted on an agreement with Moses Moody, a client now in the state penitentiary, concerning legal fees.

Anderson said that an insurance company paid Moody and Lundeen \$2,000 to settle a claim for injuries Moody suffered in an automobile accident. Anderson said the two agreed to endorse the insurance check and that Lundeen would keep one-third of the money as a fee, returning the rest to Moody.

Anderson said the state would bring out testimony in an attempt to prove Lundeen illegally retained all of the \$2,000.

Mark Weatherford, Albany attorney, said the defense expected to prove that Moody owed Lundeen more than the amount of the insurance check. Weatherford told the court that Lundeen made several trips to the state of Washington, at Moody's request, on his client's behalf.

Moody, one of the first state witnesses in the second trial Wednesday, denied this.

The state accused Lundeen of converting to his own use \$1,312.71 which rightfully belonged to Moody.

Another state witness, L. R. Barnes, deputy prison warden, testified that he overheard Lundeen and Moody discuss the \$2,000 insurance check.



Adlai Stevenson Prepares Nationwide Speech Tonight

HARRISBURG, Pa. — Adlai Stevenson "formally" opens his campaign for the presidency tonight with a \$200,000 speech.

The Democratic nominee will speak to a nationwide audience over all possible networks—three television and four radio—in a "saturation" effort to develop what aides call "an important theme" in the campaign. They kept the precise subject secret.

Time of broadcast is 8:30 p.m. EST.

Stevenson's staff members said the cost of the aired speech would exceed \$200,000. TV sources placed the figure at \$280,000.

Stevenson flew into Harrisburg from New York early today so he could have ample time to put the finishing touches on the address in the privacy of Gov. George M. Leader's executive mansion.

He came by chartered plane with his running mate Sen. Estes Kefauver of Tennessee, Gov. Leader, staff members and newsmen.

Several hundred persons were on hand at Harrisburg State Airport to greet him when he landed at 1:10 a.m.

Two dozen girls in pale-blue "Stevenson" dresses—similar to the costume worn by girl supporters at the Democratic convention in Chicago—were among the newcomers.

Stevenson will deliver his address in the large arena of the State Farm Show Building at a \$50-a-plate fund-raising dinner. Staff members said that 10,000 persons were expected to attend.

State Republican leaders have accused Pennsylvania Democrats of dumping persons into buying tickets for the dinner.

The eighth and last of a series of regional conferences Stevenson and Kefauver conducted on their coast-to-coast travels was held in New York yesterday.

Meats Seen As Bargain

A good variety of meats—except beef—will be featured on the bargain lists of many stores this weekend.

One large national chain reported sirloin steaks were up from 2 to 19 cents virtually everywhere, with rib roasts up from 2 to 6 cents in many places. Another supermarket man pegged the price of beef at 7½ cents above a year ago and said gloomily it would probably be higher next week.

The high prices reflect last month's high wholesale prices.

Hams, leg of lambs, lamb chops, turkeys and chickens—fryers, broilers and cut-up parts—will be most common. Such items as pork chops, pork sausage and frankfurters will be pushed in a few areas.

Pork prices are expected to go down in the weeks ahead. But housewives looking for a repeat performance of last winter's pork super bargains will be disappointed.

Among the vegetables, corn, lettuce and such greens as spinach, endive and escarole are all rated outstanding buys by produce men.

Cabbage, which has been unusually low priced for some time, was reported as slightly higher in some sections this week, but still a good buy.

Beans of all kinds also are moderately priced, along with cauliflower, potatoes and tomatoes.

Prunes, at the peak of their season, are reported the best buy among the fruits, although seedless grapes also are low priced.

The Sept. 1 crop report estimated the 1956 potato production would be some 6 million hundred-weight larger than last year.

AFBF President Charles B. Shuman, in a letter to Agriculture Secretary Ezra T. Benson, said "potato prices in recent weeks have been dropping rapidly."

With a larger fall crop anticipated, he said, "There is every reason to believe that potato prices will remain at relatively low levels for the remainder of the marketing season."

Shuman asked Benson to launch the diversion program "as soon as possible."

Estes Raps Ike's Outlook On Democratic Farm Plans

YORK, Pa. — Sen. Estes Kefauver accused President Eisenhower today of cynicism about Democratic efforts to maintain a prosperous family-farm economy in rural America.

"In case you missed the newspapers in the past day or two, I bring you the information that Gen. Eisenhower has come out against 'get rich quick' programs for the American farmer," the Democratic vice presidential candidate declared in a prepared address at the York County Fair.

He said Eisenhower made the comment at a press conference Tuesday. Kefauver said:

"Get rich quick! Let Mr. Eisenhower tell his banker friends he's against 'get rich quick' programs. Let him tell it to General Motors. Let him tell it to the well-heeled gentlemen he invites to those stag dinners at the White House."

"But don't let him tell one of the lowest income groups in the nation that he is opposed to their getting rich quick."

"I believe the farmers of America are ready to turn back to their true friends the Democrats."

with a questioner at his news conference, Eisenhower said:

"I have said time and again there are two things here we must do: we must preserve our most precious asset, our soil and water resources, for future generations and, at the same time, we must work out a program under which the agricultural community can share properly in our unprecedented prosperity . . ."

"Now, if we are going to do that, it is going to take some patience and some working out. And people who get impatient and believe in get-rich-quick cures may disagree."

"My program along this line has been restated time and again. I follow principle, and if that is what they want, that is what I will give . . ."

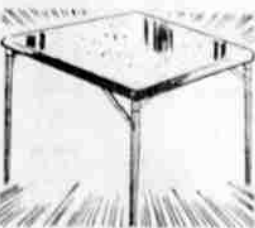
