In the young bird series Prime and Matt battled it out for average speed. Matt won the young bird trophy with an average speed of 1037.601 yards a minute in three races, totaling 300.234 miles. Prime came in a close second with 1031.161 yards a minute to beat out Frank Braman's 1019.438 yards in the three races, with a total mileage of 371.225 miles.

The old bird series went off rather well in Portland. No birds home in a day from there. Only one bird home from Yakima in race time, Frank Braman's 333 RCC accomplishing that feat. Old bird average speed winner was Frank Braman, who was presented with a trophy by the Crater Lake Racing Pigeon Club.

The Spokane race, 435 air miles, was a washout. First bird was Braman's 554, two weeks late. "Jimmy" Prime, the young novice, is reported to have all the earmarks of being an accomplished pigeoneer.

over those of the current period, a faculty pay increase is urgently needed, and the education system must have revenue to operate new additions to the system. In addition to salary increases, there are also many staff additions to accommodate the expanding enrollments.

Referring back to the state's present tax structure, Geary pointed to the critical need for the November passage of Proposition One, which would permit the Legislature to pass tax measures which would become effective immediately after passage. He emphasized that the people would by all means retain the power of referendum, but that the needed bills would be in operation during the referendum period and until the measures were either approved or rejected by vote.

Citing cases in the past, the legislator explained that the inability of the legislators to affix the emergency clause often resulted in a delay of between 18 months and two years before the effective date of a given bill.

"All it did," he stressed, "is save millions for the groups which were to be taxed, while withholding the badly needed money from the state and thereby impairing the budgetary efforts of legislators and department heads."

Citing the advantages of a sales tax program as related to the existing income tax plan, Geary said it has been proven in other states that sales tax receipts are much less subject to fluctuation than are the proceeds from income taxation.

The tax committee has done considerable research into the tax structures of Oregon and its immediate neighbors. The findings indicate that Oregon is geared to an income tax program, Washington operates from the sales tax basis, and California pretty well combines the two.

For a family of four, with an income of \$5,000, it was found that the tax paid in California would be \$292 annually, compared with \$244 in Washington, and \$277 in Oregon. The same family of four, with an income of \$6,000 would pay \$384 in California, \$296 in Washington, and \$333 in Oregon. Stepping up the ladder a bit, the \$8,000 family of four would pay \$569 in California, \$391 in Washington, and \$377 in Oregon.

"It is vital that there be complete cooperation between the life underwriter, the attorney and the certified public accountant in the field of complete estate analysis," stated Anthony Molatore Jr., CPA, speaking at the September meeting of the Klamath Basin Life Underwriters Association last week. "In these days of specialization it is not possible for any one man to be able to fulfill all the functions of these professions," Molatore said. "Today, no rule can be laid down for all cases, but rather each individual case needs the personal attention of every person concerned," he stated. Molatore further explained how this cooperation can be of value to the client.

Molatore also discussed the problems confronting the life underwriter today with his own accounting and tax reports. He stressed the necessity of each underwriter keeping complete records for all of his expenditures.

"It is necessary that all receipts and records be kept in order that full deductions for all business expenses may be taken," Molatore was introduced by Bob Perkins, Great West Life, program chairman.

Three Given Prison Terms

Three men were sentenced to Oregon State Prison Friday by Circuit Judge Charles Foster of Lakeview, after they pleaded guilty here to felonies.
