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Malin Postal Routes Changed

MALIN—The star route postal delivery in the Malin area has been changed so as to benefit a greater number of people according to L. L. Storey, postmaster of the Malin Post Office. This route now includes an additional 10 patrons and covers an additional four miles.

Also included in the star route are about 19 patrons who were formerly on Rural Route 1 and covering an additional two miles of delivery. Pansy B. Hornbeak who has the contract for delivery on the star route, will include the new routes in her deliveries.

Effective September 8, RFD features have been incorporated in the star route. These include sell-

ing of stamps, accepting mail for registration, for certification, for insurance and for c.o.d. by the carrier if the patron meets the carrier at the mail box. The same classes of mail will continue to be delivered on the star route.

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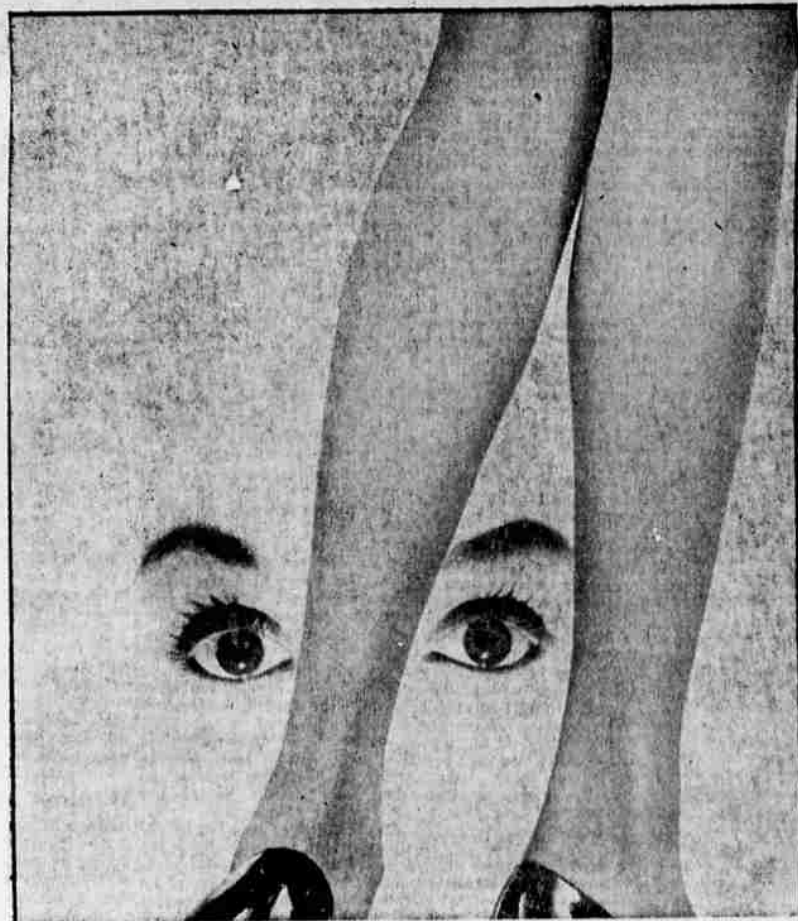


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
