

Stevenson To Blast At Nixon During Campaign

HARRISBURG, Pa. (UP)—Adlai E. Stevenson left little room for doubt today that he will set up Vice President Richard M. Nixon as main target of his Democratic presidential campaign.

Stevenson sought in his campaign kickoff speech Thursday night to paint President Eisenhower as a "part-time" president who no longer is "master in his own house."

Republican leaders, he said, will look to Nixon as their "heir apparent."

And today Stevenson's running mate, Sen. Estes Kefauver, followed up with a blast at Nixon for "playing fast and loose with the facts" and "distorting the truth" about unemployment.

Stevenson and Kefauver were scheduled to leave by plane today for Washington, D.C., where their paths separate. Stevenson will remain in the capital about a week, while Kefauver stumps Florida.

HEARD OVER TV

Stevenson delivered his speech Thursday night before a crowd of 8,500 who had paid \$50 a plate for a cold buffet supper earlier. His remarks were carried over all radio and television networks, at a cost of more than \$200,000 to the Democrats.

Stevenson charged that "partly by choice, partly by necessity," Mr. Eisenhower has turned government powers over to men who represent "business, mostly big business."

"Everyone shares in sympathy for the circumstances which have created a part-time presidency," Stevenson said.

"But we cannot understand—and we will not accept—turning the government over to men who work full-time for the wrong people or a limited group of people," he continued.

CONCERNED OVER FUTURE

"And the plain truth is that this situation would get worse not better in a continuation of this administration, because what influence the President has with the Republicans in Congress has depended on his running again."

"But from here on the future of Republican leaders will depend not on Mr. Eisenhower, but the Republican heir apparent, Mr. Nixon and the vice president seems to sail down wind no matter which way the wind blows."

Stevenson said these were "stern facts" and "the reasons America's human needs go today unmet."

"Nor will they be met so long as the President is not master in his own house," he said.

Stevenson's mention of Nixon's name drew a loud boo from the crowd, a reflection of the bitterness felt by many Democratic faithful for the vice president.

Police Stage Wild Gunfight

NEW YORK (UP)—Thousands of Staten Island citizens ducked for cover Thursday when police, three of whom were wounded, fired more than 100 shots in felling a fugitive.

The wild manhunt ranged over a mile-square area in the early afternoon until the wounded and cornered fugitive collapsed in a residential district garage.

A deputy sheriff, a patrolman and a detective were all wounded by the Negro "cop fighter" with a gun he snatched from a correction department guard in his escape from Richmond County Court House.

Another patrolman collapsed of a heart attack during the two-hour chase.

The fugitive—Henry Bryant, 28, alias "Black Frankie"—threw away his .38 caliber revolver and gave up when 25 detectives and patrolmen closed in.

Bryant was cut down with wounds of the neck, shoulder and arm. He was treated in Staten Island Hospital.

Solons Hold Paint Probe

WASHINGTON (UP)—A Senate committee sought today to find out whether the treasury took a shelling when the Post Office Department painted its mail boxes and trucks red, white and blue.

Chairman Olin D. Johnston (D-S.C.) of the Senate Post Office Committee summoned spokesmen for the Post Office Department and the General Services Administration as first witnesses at the paint hearings.

The committee is investigating complaints that the department used improper procedures in contracting for the patriotic paint job which replaced the old olive-drab on postal equipment late in 1955.

Johnston said he has received complaints that "the Post Office Department has favored a well-known paint manufacturer and unduly restricted competition in purchasing the required materials."

Five Killed In Collision

PANAMA CITY, Fla. (UP)—An old car and a pickup truck rammed together in a twisted heap at an intersection late Thursday night, killing five persons and injuring three others seriously.

None of the survivors could talk and highway patrolmen investigating the tangled vehicles could not tell which ran through the stop sign at the rural intersection five miles from here. There were no other witnesses.

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County Museum Arranges Trip To Tulelake Refuge

A visit to the Tulelake Wildlife National Refuge on Sunday, September 23, has been arranged by Klamath County Museum curator, Claude E. Schaeffer, to give a number of Klamath Falls residents an opportunity to witness the great natural spectacle of the fall migration of waterfowl through the Klamath Basin.

The migration of ducks, geese and other varieties of birdlife will be present in impressive numbers on streams and lakes of the region at that time.

The trip will be conducted by J. L. O'Donahue, well known local authority on birdlife, who will identify the species and habits of the winged visitors.

Arrangements for the trip have been made with the wildlife refuge officials and it is expected that LeRoy Giles, wildlife management biologist will join the group as a representative of the Fish and Wildlife Service.

This excursion, the first in the museum's planned program of nature study, is an experiment and the degree of response is uncertain. In order to keep the party of manageable size, applicants will be limited to the first 25 who register for the trip at the museum.

Since the outing is to last most of the day, those desiring to go are asked to provide their own lunch, binoculars, camera and transportation by car.
