Kentucky Governor Tells Why National Guard Used

FRANKFORT, Ky. — An angry mob stormed the courthouse at Lexington 36 years ago, bent on taking a young Negro rapist to the nearest tree. Six men were killed.

Gov. A. B. Chandler, then a student at Transylvania College, watched as officers turned back the raiders with machineguns.

"As they retreated," Chandler recalled in an interview today, "they left six or seven of their number sprawled on the ground dead."

"Federal troops were brought in from Louisville, but too late to save men's lives. They didn't act fast enough."

He told the story in explaining why National Guard troops and state policemen were sent, on his orders, into Sturgis, Ky., two weeks ago to keep order in strife stirred up by the admission of Negroes in a previously all-white school.

"That experience was in my mind when the Sturgis trouble broke out," he said. "But I would have done as I did anyway."

"Mobs led by bad-tempered men were taking over. You can't let mobs enforce the law. The rights of the people were at stake. Streets were closed. Lives were in danger."

"We had to act fast. We knew the situation, because we had the information from an air-intelligence organization."

"My orders were to move in—not to force people to do things, but to open the streets and give the people free movement. I gave instructions to take over in force."

"The tanks were taken along for the proper psychological effect. Some men won't let a soldier with a gun push them. No man is going to argue with a tank."

"I am pleased with the results we have obtained so far. After all, nobody has been hurt and nobody has been killed. You can speculate that the reverse might have been true if we had acted slower. I am convinced that the trouble at Sturgis would have been serious."

"Asked if he considered his action 'politically popular,' he said he was not concerned in the least over political implications."

"At times like this, you don't consider politics," he said. "You do the job you are sworn to do."

He said it was "absolutely untrue" that his friendship with Mayor Herman Z. Clark of Clay influenced his late movement of troops into that town after "taking over" in Sturgis from the outset.

Chandler then explained how secret agents of the state kept abreast of the situation in both Sturgis and Clay.

He said plainclothes state detectives moved into Sturgis when word first arrived that trouble was brewing.

"They wore overalls and mixed with crowds," he said. "They even attended the demonstrators' meetings. They knew what was going to happen as soon as anybody else did. In that way, we were prepared for the proper action at the proper time."

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
