Carmody-Faha Vows Said In 10 a.m. Nuptial Mass

LAKEVIEW—A lovely autumn bride was Izette Ann Faha whose marriage to Richard John Carmody was solemnized at a 10 a.m. nuptial Mass in Lakeview St. Patrick's Church on Saturday, September 9. Officiant at the double-ring ceremony was the Rev. James O'Connor.

The bride is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Jesse Faha, Lakeview, and the bridegroom is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard J. Carmody, also of Lakeview. Escorted to the altar by her father, the bride wore a chapel-length dress of white French lace and nylon tulle over satin. The fitted, long-sleeved bodice was of lace with seed pearls and iridescent sequins trimming the scalloped neckline. The full skirt cascaded from the waist in alternate flounces of lace and tulle. Her finger tip veil of illusion was held by a sequin and pearl trimmed crown of lace. Her bridal bouquet was of white roses.

Patricia Gatto of Matka, California, maid of honor, wore a ballerina length dress of sea foam green tulle with a matching cap and a circular veil of tulle in the same shade. Dressed identically was the bridesmaid, Jo Ann McDonald, Lakeview. Both girls

carried bouquets of bronze pom-poms.

Best man was Robert Bye, Portland, and ushering were Donald Borden, also Portland, Thomas Burke of Grants Pass, and the bridegroom's brother-in-law, Donald Magale of Klamath Falls.

Church decorations were bouquets of white gladioli and white pom-poms with touches of green. Mrs. M. M. Barry was organist for the wedding music.

At the reception in the parish hall, the bride's cake was cut by Mrs. Forrest E. Cooper, assisted by Mrs. A. L. O. Schuler, Mrs. J. C. Clark, assisted by Mrs. Jess Roberts, cut and served the bridegroom's cake.

Presiding at the coffee service were Mrs. Fitz Binnion and Mrs. H. E. Kelly, with Mrs. Lloyd Ogle at the tea service. Mrs. C. J. Clause was in charge of the guest book.

For her daughter's wedding Mrs. Faha wore an afternoon frock of gray lace over rose taffeta with matching satin hat and shoes. Mrs. Carmody chose Wedgewood blue lace with matching velvet hat and gray slippers. Both wore white orchid corsages.

The bride's going-away suit of black was accented with white gloves and a white velvet and striped ostrich feather hat. Her accessories were black, and her corsage was a white orchid.

Following a short wedding trip to the coast they will occupy an apartment in Lakeview until January when they will move to Eugene where Carmody will continue his studies at the University of Oregon, where his bride will also be a student.

Both 1952 graduates of Lakeview High School, the bride attended the College of the Holy Names in Oakland and the bridegroom attended Southern Oregon College and the University of Oregon.

Here for the wedding were the bride's grandmother, Mrs. Frank Faha of Dyersville, Iowa, and the bridegroom's grandfather, Con J. O'Callaghan of Dunsmuir. For her far-away from home wedding, the bride wore a dress from far-away France. The gown of white Chantilly lace, French tulle and candlelight satin was designed and made in Paris for Frances when she was in school there last spring.

The beautifully fitting snug bodice of lace was fastened with satin and lace covered buttons from the high neckline in back to below the slim waistline. A row of buttons also fastened the bracelet length sleeves from the elbow to the tapered wrist ends.

Yards of generously gathered French tulle, billowed from the smooth hipline of the bodice into the countless folds of the beautiful overskirt which fanned into an abbreviated but very full chapel train.

A tiara of miniature orange blossoms which the bride also brought from Paris held her gossamer veil of silk illusion. Frances carried a cascade bouquet of white gardenias and lilacs-of-the-valley and her only jewelry was a pair of heirloom pearl earrings, a gift from the bridegroom.

Matron of honor was the bride's sister-in-law, Mrs. Ralph W. Stearns Jr., Malin; and the two bridesmaids were Carol Keltner, friend and classmate; and Bernice Morris, sister of the bridegroom. All wore white French tulle full-length dresses with long torso bodices of fine tucking—made with oval necklines.

Interesting color accent was achieved with contrasting carnation colored taffeta sashes which girdled the hipline and cascaded into wide streamers down the back of the skirt. The attendants all wore matching carnation satin slippers and carried cascade arrangements of carnation and white chrysanthemums.

The hall fireplace was filled with shiny gardenias and a striking arrangement of white chrysanthemums decorated the mantel. Focal point on the punch table were epergnes filled with white flowers and candelabra entwined with white flowers held lighted tapers which illuminated the white-lace-covered cake table. Helen Brill, the bridegroom's niece from Linn Grove, carried the bride's book; and Joanna Hemken, Des Moines, Iowa, poured coffee and presided at the gift table.

After a Canadian honeymoon north of Winnipeg, the couple will be at home in Salt Lake City where Morris is enrolled as a graduate student at the University of Utah working for a doctorate in the bio-chemistry department.

For travel, the bride wore a brown suit of English material purchased in London and made for her in Paris. A brown feather cap and brown accessories completed her ensemble.

"Cherish and Maintain American Freedom" was the theme adopted by the Continental Congress for the year 1956-57. Some of the resolutions passed in keeping with that theme and discussed by Mrs. Roenicke, are as follows:

"Resolved, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, continue earnest efforts to spread knowledge of our constitutional government and appreciation of the American way of life, so that we may insure the future destiny of the United States."

"Resolved, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, again go on record, for the sixth time at our annual Continental Congress, in strong endorsement of the principles of an amendment to our constitution to provide that a provision of a treaty or other international agreement which conflicts with any provision of our constitution shall not be of any force or effect."

"Resolved, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, continue to support the United Nations Organization in its original purpose as a group of sovereign nations working together for world peace and understanding, and to oppose its threatened conversion into a world government."

"Resolved, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, again stand firmly and emphatically on its insistence that the United Nations abide by the objectives set forth in its charter and desist from participation in any plan, project, agency or principle which would intervene in our internal affairs, interfere with our domestic legislation, or spread doctrines contrary to our American

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
