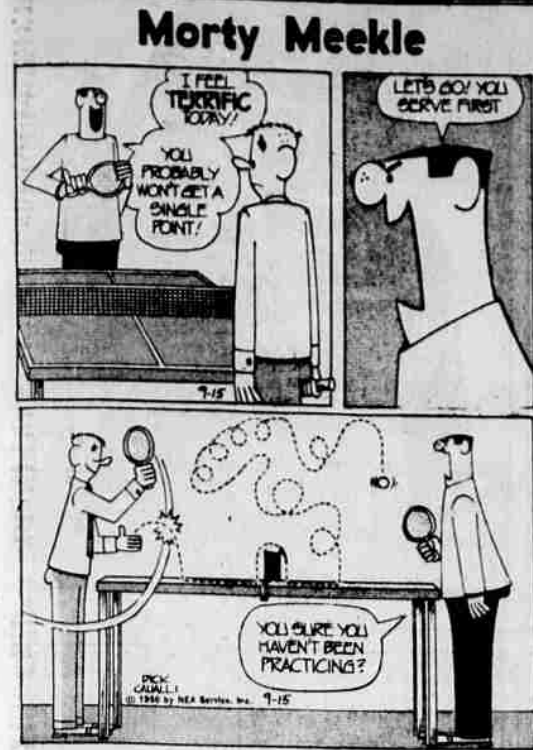




Negro Enrollment Barred By Kentucky School Board

CLAY, Ky. (AP) — The Webster County School Board said Friday night it will not permit enrollment at the Clay School of three Negro children who have attended classes under National Guard protection.

Supt. Wilbur Collins, said the three Negroes would be informed of the seven-member unanimous decision Monday morning.

However, he added he could not prevent the guardsmen from escorting the children to school again. But, he said, city and county officials believe Gov. A. B. Chandler will withdraw the troops.

The decision, made by nearby Dixon, came on the heels of an opinion by State Atty. Gen. J. M. Ferguson that the Negroes

KLAMATH COUNTY COUNCIL OF PTA

Approximately 53 members attended the first fall meeting of Klamath County Council of PTA, Tuesday, September 11, at the Willard Hotel.

The meeting was opened by the president, Mrs. Art Moore, who welcomed those present and announced the following committee chairmen for the year 1956-1957: parliamentarian, Mrs. Eldred Hanson; program, Gary Robertson; historian, Mrs. Laurence L. Weinberg; savings stamps, Mrs. Hagman; publicity, Mrs. John W. Insley; hospitality, Mrs. R. J. Brinegar; magazine, Mrs. George Meade and Mrs. Duane Cassidy; scholarship, Mrs. John Putnam; legislative, Charles McLin; radio and television, Mrs. Ed Swansen; parent education, Mrs. Orson Stearns; civil defense, Mrs. Gordon Loomis; Founders Day, Mrs. D. L. Dunkeson.

Officers for the year are: president, Mrs. Art Moore; vice president, Mrs. D. L. Dunkeson; secretary, Mrs. Axel Carlson; treasurer, Mrs. James Barnes.

The president stated that last year PTA memberships in Klamath County totaled 2,788, representing 987 men and 1,801 women; homes in the schools were 3,247 and represented in PTA were 1,843, which would indicate that every effort must be made to encourage additional PTA memberships.

Unit magazine chairmen were urged to meet at Mrs. Moore's home, 935 Newcastle, Friday, September 14, from 1-2 p.m. to make magazine aprons, bringing with them the following materials: one yard organdy, one package rick-rack and three front covers from old PTA magazines.

A very successful program and parent education workshop was conducted in Klamath Falls August 22 by Dr. R. N. Lowe, of the University of Oregon, and Mrs. L. T. Fisher, OCPPT Program chairman. Chairmen of the meeting was Mrs. Leigh Gustison, junior vice president of Region 5, which includes Curry, Josephine, Jackson, Klamath and Lake counties.

Films showing what the Navy is doing may be secured free of charge from the Naval Reserve office in Klamath Falls for use at unit meetings, and a list of these films may be secured from Mrs. Moore.

The study group course this year will be concerned with mental health, and will cover three fields: mental health, pre-school and adolescent. These radio talks will be taped at Corvallis and rebroadcast, and notification of the topic and date will be made a week in advance. In this connection, Mrs. Hagan Moore advised that a new psychiatric social worker would be in Klamath Falls next month.

Mrs. Hagan Moore, savings stamp chairman, expressed the hope that all units that participated in the savings stamp program last year would do so again this year, and urged the chairmen to contact her if they encountered any difficulties.

The president reminded unit representatives that council dues are due and payable during October.

There will be no regular council meeting in October, due to the fact that Mrs. Ellen Dell Bieler, field representative of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers, will be in Klamath Falls October 5. All officers and chairmen are urged to attend this meeting at the Klamath County Library building from 1-4 p.m.

Youth Riots Hit Europe; Music Cited

LONDON (AP) — A wave of youth riots has been rolling over Britain — to the pulsating beat of rock 'n' roll music from America — but kids across the English Channel so far are not excited.

In Norway teen-agers "are playing rock 'n' roll just like everybody else but they're keeping their shirts on," says an Oslo dispatch. Italy's only reaction is a large-scale sale of records.

Frankfurt reports it's difficult to assess the part rock 'n' roll and other jazz are playing in soldier incidents in West Germany, but many incidents begin in bars where juke boxes regularly blare out American music.

Rock 'n' roll has been banned from the radio in Communist East Germany. However, word has seeped through that East Germany youth is going for it and picking up everything available from radio stations in the American sector.

Rock 'n' roll seems to be known in Paris only because of the antics in London and elsewhere.

The British antics, accompanying the showing of the American film, "Rock Around the Clock," exploded into a wide headache to the nation's understaffed police force.

Rioting began Aug. 28 in a movie house in London's Shepherd's Bush section when 60 teen-agers jived up and down the aisles to the blaring notes of "See You Later Alligator." When the manager protested the gang picked him up and pitched him into the theater lobby.

Two nights later a rhythm-happy group of Teddy Boys (teen-agers who dress in narrow pants and long coats) pounded up and down the aisles of a Paddington theater and finally one of them slashed the protesting manager with a razor.

Five London movie houses showing the film had to call on the police Sept. 2 when teen-agers got out of hand and smashed seats and slashed the screen. Police and special guards battled with the youths Sept. 4 in 12 theaters showing the picture.

In Manchester Sept. 9 Teddy Boys ripped firehoses from walls, sprayed the audience and then rushing outside tied up the city's downtown traffic for an hour.

Eleven movie houses, from Wellington in Kent to Bootle in Lancashire, called out police riot squads Sept. 10.

The work includes construction of an irrigation pumping station, rehabilitation of portions of canals, new irrigation and drainage structures and construction and repair of existing structures.

The pumping station is to be installed west of Highway 97 and will house three pumps, only two of which are to be installed on this contract.

Paper Faces Libel Suits

PORTLAND (AP) — Libel suits totaling \$300,000 were filed against The Oregonian here and at Eugene Friday. The suits, filed by Lane County Circuit Judge Frank B. Reid and Eugene attorney William Huey each ask \$50,000 general damages and \$100,000 punitive damages.

Harlow Schillios, identified by the suits as a Eugene newspaper man, also was named a defendant.

Reid and Huey contend that Schillios wrote an article published in the Aug. 12, 1956 edition of the newspaper, aimed at bringing them "into public scandal, infamy and disgrace."

The article was a report on a speech made by Lane County Dist. Atty. Eugene Venn.

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
