WALL STREET
NEW YORK (U) — The stock market lost ground Monday with numerous key issues off 1 to 2 points a share.

Gains generally were in fractions, with a few specialties ahead around 2.

The market moved higher in the early stages but gradually backed down in slower trading as the day progressed.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks declined 50 cents to \$131.60, with industrials off 70 cents, rails off \$1.20 and utilities up 20 cents.

Volume amounted to 1,940,000 shares, compared with Friday's 2,110,000 shares.

CHICAGO (U) — A sharp run-up in soybean prices after early ease featured active grain dealings on the Board of Trade Monday.

Beans were bought aggressively following reports processing interests would meet with government officials to discuss plans to expand soybean oil exports under the law which permits payments in foreign currencies.

Wheat and rye also were strong, both going to new seasonal highs on short covering. Greece was granted an authorization to buy 10 million bushels of bread grains between now and Nov. 30.

Wheat closed unchanged to 1 1/4 higher, September \$2.26-2.26 1/2, corn 1 1/4-3 1/4 higher, September \$1.32 1/2-1 1/4, oats 1 1/4-3 1/4 higher, September \$1.21-1 1/4, soybeans 4 1/4-3 1/4 higher, September \$2.35-2.35 1/4 and land 32 to 45 cents a pound higher, October \$11.65.

CHICAGO (U) — Butcher hogs and cows sold steadily to 25 cents higher Monday.

Butchers scaling 170 to 190 pounds went at \$13.25 to \$13.75 while those in the 190 to 270 pound bracket mostly brought \$13.75 to \$16.15. However, there were sales up to \$16.35.

Steers sold steady to 50 cents lower while heifers were steady to weak. High choice and prime steers sold at \$29.00 to \$32.75 but some were held above \$33.00. Buyers paid \$25.00 to \$28.50 for most choice steers and \$20.00 to \$24.50 for good to low choice. Most choice and prime heifers went at \$23.50 to \$27.50.

Most good to prime spring lambs went at \$19.50 to \$23.50. Receipts were hogs 9,000, cattle 2,100 and sheep 3,000.

Singer, Girl Save 24 Lives

SAN FRANCISCO (U) — A beautiful young night club singer and a 12-year-old girl were credited with saving the lives of a total of 24 persons in separate fires here early today. One man died in one of the fires.

Fran Jeffries, 22, a performer at Ann's 440 Broadway club, discovered a fire in a two-story apartment house on Dolores St. while driving home from work.

She awoke the owner, Grace Meyers, 61, and then raised five occupants of the building. But Nat Rivard, 55, a semi-invalid, was overcome by smoke and pronounced dead on arrival at Park Emergency Hospital. The coroner's office said death was caused by asphyxiation and second and third degree burns.

Firemen said the blaze started in Rivard's room after he apparently fell asleep or had a heart attack while smoking a cigarette on a couch.

"The three other women came to my house and told me about the shooting," Bryant said. "I was unable to locate the accused woman. One of the other women said she would file a formal complaint sometime Monday."

Bulk Barley Rates Revealed
