

Planet Golden Rule Asked

ROME (UP)—The director of the American Rocket Society said today that man should not land on inhabited planets unless invited to do so.

The director, lawyer Andrew G. Haley, of Washington, D.C., said travel into outer space would "dignify and enrich mankind, erasing forever devastating economic problems."

But he said man should obey the "golden rule" and spaceships should not land on planets inhabited by other intelligent beings until invited to do so.

Haley's comments came as delegates from 22 nations, including the Soviet Union, held preliminary sessions for Tuesday's opening of the International Astronautical Congress.

His remarks were based on the probability that there is not only life but intelligent life — possibly human-like creatures — elsewhere in the universe.

"There is little evidence to indicate that there is other intelligent life in our solar system," Haley said.

But our own galaxy, the Milky Way, contains 40 billion stars, many larger and some smaller than our own sun, and in creation we know that there are at least 48 billion galaxies.

Two were killed in mishaps involving motorcycles.

Nancy Lee Hatfield, 6, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Leslie Hatfield, Roseburg, suffered a fatal chest wound when a standing motorcycle fell on her.

Her father had parked the machine in the yard of their home and the little girl was playing near it. A clutch handle on the handlebars pierced her chest.

Rachel King, 17, of Seapooose, was injured fatally Saturday night when a motorcycle on which she was riding was struck from the rear by an automobile driven by Larry R. Johnson, Vernonia. The crash occurred in fog on the Vernonia-Seapooose Highway. The driver of the motorcycle, Jack T. Roberts, 22, Portland, was not badly hurt.

Edmund Evers, 28, of Forest Grove, was killed early Sunday when his automobile plunged off a Washington County highway one-half mile south of Roy. He was alone in the car.

Sue Lee Stowe, 1 1/2-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Floyd A. Stowe Jr., of Elgin, drowned Sunday in a farm pond. She apparently slipped on a muddy bank and toppled into the shallow pool.

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Man Stabbed In Chemult

State police were seeking an unidentified knife-wielder Monday who was involved in a fight in a Southern Pacific work train near Chemult which resulted in one man being stabbed and another suffering a broken leg.

The victims were taken to Klamath Valley Hospital Saturday night in a Kaler ambulance. They were identified as Augustine Jackson, 44-year-old track worker, and J. P. McCoomb, 61-year-old railroad cook.

According to ambulance driver James Kaler, Jackson was stabbed in the shoulder and suffered considerable loss of blood.

McCoomb broke his leg while going from one car to another in the train after he was awakened by the fight.

Police said the man who did the knifing had been hanging around the work train for several days.

Benson Raps Demos' Plan

CHICAGO (AP)—Secretary of Agriculture Benson Monday said the Democratic farm plan is "pessimistic because it calls upon government to be the market for which farmers would produce."

Benson said the Democratic program "assumes there is no future for farmers except government subsidy at a level which would involve government dictation and control over their production."

In an address prepared for a convention of the National Food Locker Institute, Benson said "I would like to ask, personally, every farmer across this great land whether he would like to have the government tell him what he can grow and how much, what he can sell and how much?"

"Or, would he choose as his alternative . . . a program designed to eliminate market-destroying, price-destroying, income-destroying surpluses that now hang over him—a program grounded in the conviction that government can do much to aid farmers, but that government should operate always in the role of servant and never in the role of master."

Benson said farmers don't want more surpluses . . . they don't want agriculture socialized."

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
