Yreka Water Lack Seen

YREKA — A big water shortage for Yreka was predicted by Al Crebbin, chairman of the water committee, in making a report to the Yreka City Council at the water meeting last week.

Crebbin predicted an annual shortage of over 175 million gallons of water within the next ten years unless additional water is brought in from outside the watershed.

In a summary of his plan, Crebbin said his studies of the annual rainfall from 1915 to 1955 indicated a normal of 16.54 inches per year could be expected to go below 50 per cent of normal in about three years out of each ten years.

"We were 29 million gallons short in 1955," said Crebbin, "and the deficiency was from June to October, when consumption is up."

The water committee proposal is for a 5,960 drainage area and a 25 foot dam in the Greenhorn basin impounding about 50 million gallons of water. Crebbin thought the cost might run to one and one half million dollars to impound a two-year supply of water. He thought the city's best hope might be under application under public law 566 which provides interest free loans to small municipalities and counties.

Farm adviser S. D. Nelson thought additional wells would be the most logical solution to the water problem.

Further discussion on water problems will be held September 27, and meetings will be continued until the critical water situation is under control, councilmen agreed.

State Board Asks Survey

YREKA — The state allocations board has asked the Sixtyfour Joint Union High School District for a new survey of present high school buildings in the belief that some of them are worth remodeling for school use. Dr. Jere Hurley, superintendent of the district, reported at a chamber of commerce meeting last week.

He said the Yreka High School building program will be held up until this new engineering survey is made of the present buildings. Howard Perrin, architect for the new high school project, stated that bringing the old buildings up to specifications of the Fields Act, which requires earthquake proof construction, would cost at least 70 per cent of the cost of a new replacement.

Range Society Names Nominees

The society is a professional group organized to further the study of range management and pasture problems.

Plane Probes Space Fields

HANSCOM AIR FORCE BASE, Mass. — A huge Air Force plane, loaded with special instruments, Monday was on the first lap of a 90,000-mile around the world flight to probe the magnetic fields which extend thousands of miles beyond the earth's surface.

The trip, which began Sunday, may provide data to help launch America's planned man-made moon and may yield information valuable for guided missile research. Air Force scientists would not comment.

The scientists would say only that the expedition is "of purely scientific interest" with no immediate application.

Green Fir Market Weak

EUGENE — The green fir market continues weak because of heavy production and low demand, the weekly lumber market letter, Random Lengths, reports.

Direct mill shipments were reported to be low and retail yard demand for mixed car lots of green and kiln dried lumber was slow.

No substantial price reductions were expected and plywood was reported holding to its basing price of \$72 a thousand for quarter-inch, air-dried stock. A few plants were offering extra discounts.

13 Complete Snake Voyage

LEWISTON, Idaho — Thirteen men have completed a six-day 127-mile trip on rubber pontoon barges through Hells Canyon of the Snake River.

The party was led by Blaine Stubblefield of Weiser and left Homestead, Ore., last Monday morning. The group arrived here Saturday afternoon. Each night the adventurers camped on the banks of the river so members could fish.

Stubblefield's crew which managed the 27 by 17-foot rambling pretzel raft consisted of his brother-in-law, Fred Stubblefield, and 11 other men.
