Siskiyou Chest X-Rays Slated

TULELAKE—The Siskiyou County Tuberculosis and Health Association will conduct its annual free X-ray survey throughout the county from September 23 to October 12.

The survey is for the purpose of discovering unknown cases of tuberculosis and other chest conditions such as lung cancer and various types of heart conditions. The X-rays are free of charge and are paid for by the sale of Christmas seals.

During the 1955 campaign, 5,489 X-rays were taken in Siskiyou County. The association hopes to double that number this year.

The X-ray unit will be in Tulelake, Friday, October 12 from 1 to 5 p.m. and from 6 to 8 p.m. the same day.

BROKEN WRIST

LONDON (AP) — Prince Michael of Kent, 14-year-old cousin of Queen Elizabeth II, is nursing a broken wrist. Buckingham Palace announced the prince, youngest of the three children of the widowed Duchess of Kent, fractured the wrist after he arrived with her and his sister Princess Alexandra at Balmoral Castle in Scotland Monday as a guest of the queen. The palace didn't say how it happened.

Worker Fined For Assault

Joe Vigil, 34-year-old Modoc Point railroad worker, who used a garden spade as a weapon in a free-for-all fight, pleaded guilty to a charge of assault and battery Tuesday in District Judge D. E. Van Vactor's court. He was fined \$50.

Defense Attorney George Proctor indicated to the court that Vigil was being made a "fall guy" and others involved in the fight were equally guilty.

Vigil suffered head injuries during the fracas. Mr. and Mrs. Lindsey Pompey also were injured.

Vigil's wife, Joan, 23, who also was involved was fined \$25 when she was found guilty of assault in Justice of the Peace Walter Zimmerman's court in Chiloquin.

Wood River Resident Dies

FORT KLAMATH — A pioneer Wood River Valley resident from 1919 to 1924, Mrs. Adeline Ladd, 85, died September 13 at the Doctors Hospital in Seattle. She had received a fractured hip from a fall September 8 and suffered a stroke which resulted in death after being hospitalized for the injury.

A native of California, Mrs. Ladd lived most of her life in Oregon. She had lived here the past year with her sister, Mrs. Ralph Darling, and was living with her son in Seattle at the time of her death.

She is survived by one son, J. Russell Ladd of Seattle; two sisters, Mrs. Lulu Darling of Fort Klamath and Mrs. Ida M. Rennels of Providence, Rhode Island, and two grandchildren in Seattle.

Funeral services were held at 11 a.m. September 15 at the Edward Holman and Son Funeral Chapel in Portland, with burial in the family plot in the Evergreen Memorial Cemetery in McMinnville.

Meeting Of Community Needs Urged By McCarry
