Suez Traffic Slows Down

PORT SAID, Egypt — Traffic in the Suez Canal fell to 31 ships Tuesday, the fourth day of operations exclusively by Egyptian and Greek pilots.

The daily transit average slid to 38, against an average of more than 40 before the walkout of about 100 foreign pilots Friday.

Forty-seven vessels, including some which failed in an effort to get through before the walkout deadline Friday midnight, made the trip through the canal Saturday.

Both Sunday and Monday the count was 36.

The slight decrease in the number of ships routed to the canal has been helpful to the Egyptians and their Greek associates, who are working with less rest than normal to keep the 103-mile waterway in use.

New Disarm Plan Studied

WASHINGTON — American officials are considering a new piecemeal approach to breaking the East-West disarmament deadlock.

They are taking their cue from what they regard as the apparent success of President Eisenhower's atom-for-peace plan. It is understood they are readying a proposal to Russia which might be paraphrased this way:

"We have failed to reach a general disarmament settlement. But let's see what details we can agree on, and settle those one by one."

The rest can be set aside to a later time when perhaps mutual understanding may have grown to a point where these too can be settled.

Soviet Premier Bulganin, in his latest letter to Eisenhower on disarmament, denounced anew Eisenhower's "open skies" inspection plan, proposing instead a ban on nuclear tests and limitation of armed forces.

U. S. diplomatic officials hold high hopes for a meeting in New York Thursday of some 80 countries to approve the basic agreement setting up an international atom-for-peace agency.

Police Say Publicity Led To Stolen Baby's Death

MINEOLA, N.Y. — The police officer in charge of the Weinberger kidnap case says premature publicity in a New York City newspaper led to the death of the 32-day-old baby, Peter.

Nassau County Detective Chief Stuyvesant Pinnell did not name the newspaper in his statement yesterday. But he said it refused to withhold the story and help maintain secrecy in police efforts to recover the child alive.

"I would not want such a decision on my conscience," he said.

The New York Daily News was first on the street with the story several hours after the July 4 kidnapping.

'Gator Still Loose Today

OKLAHOMA CITY — Alfred the alligator was still free today in Lincoln Park Zoo's lake but he's making his pursuers mad.

Armed with a bow and a harpoon-like arrow, Zoo Curator Bob Jenni has promised to corral the elusive Alfred, who slipped out of the reptile house early Sunday.

It was the same zoo from which a leopard escaped in 1950 for three days.

Jenni, who weighs 145 pounds, and his assistant Mike Williams spent most of yesterday splashing about in the muddy lake trying to spot Alfred.

Jenni said the fugitive needs to surface for air only about every four hours and can go a week without food. But he said he hopes to wrestle 250-pound Alfred into a noose soon.

The slightly built curator got off two shots with his arrow but one missed and the second arrow was knocked loose by Alfred.

Jenni hopes to stick the arrow in Alfred and pull him to shallow water with a cork attached to the handle. There, he says, he will battle the eight-foot reptile and tie him up.

"We'll get a noose around his neck, and then hitch around his mouth to keep it closed," Jenni explained. "Then a sort of girder effect up under his front legs to keep them still."

Jenni said Alfred poses no danger to anyone. Swimming is not allowed in the lake.

West Warm Trend Seen

Fair weather prevailed in most of the nation today, with a warm trend in the West and a little cooling reported in wide areas in the eastern half of the country.

The cooler air extended from Minnesota southward through Kansas and Texas eastward to the Atlantic Coast. Biggest temperature drops were from Illinois through Ohio, mostly around 20 degrees in the last 24 hours. Readings were in the 40s early today.

However, temperatures in the northeast section of the North Atlantic Coast states were in the 50s, five degrees higher than 24 hours earlier.

In the West, readings also were about 5 degrees higher than yesterday morning. They ranged from the 50s in the northern tier of states to the mid-90s in the Southwest desert region.

AF Receives New Rocket

HOLLOMAN, N.M. (UP) — A new "quick starting" rocket, which surpasses the speed of sound several times within two seconds, has been developed for the Air Force by the Air Research and Development Command here.

Named by researchers the "hypersonic test vehicle," it has been developed as a free flight research tool to gather data at hypersonic speeds. Announcement of its development was not made until Monday although 15 experimental models have already been fired and tested at this test center near Alamogordo, N.M.

The HTV, a two-stage propellant rocket vehicle, gathers hypersonic data when the second stage ignites and the rocket reaches maximum velocity. Data includes information on aerodynamic heating, aerodynamic shapes and air pressures.

Powered by 11 rockets, the HTV is fired from a 16-foot portable launcher. Researchers said it was only the first in a family of such rockets because Air Force engineers expect to move on to newer research rockets of improved velocity and performance.

The announcement said the first Air Force HTV was developed by Aerophysics Development Corp., Santa Monica, Calif., in conjunction with the Air Research Development Center's Wright Air Development Center.

It made its first flight test in November, 1954.

'Crash-Proof' Car Planned

NEW YORK — Designs were shown Tuesday for a "crash-proof" car that would permit its occupants to walk away after a head-on collision at 30 miles per hour.

A prototype of the safety car is now under construction.

The project was announced by F. J. Crandell, vice president of the Liberty Mutual Insurance Co. and E. R. Dye, head of the safety design research dept. of the Cornell Aeronautical Laboratory. The two groups are joint participants in the project.

From the outside the car looks much like any other sedan. But radical changes have been made inside for safety's sake.

The driver sits in the center of the car and steers with a two-handled lever-type control system. Chest pads, safety belts and bucket seats are provided for driver and passengers. One seat directly behind the driver faces to the rear.

Other safeguards include doors that will not spring open in a crash, and sheet metal stiffeners in the roof.

Rose Scores R & R Music

NEW YORK — Songwriter-showman Billy Rose declared Tuesday that Broadcast Music, Inc., an organization founded by radio broadcasters, is "responsible for rock 'n' roll and other musical monstrosities which are muddying up the airways."

Other songwriters have complained that the TV-radio networks, through BMI, control tunes heard on records, as well as on the air. BMI officials have denied it.

Testimony on the subject is being taken by the antitrust subcommittee of the House Judiciary Committee.

Rose asserted in a prepared statement to the subcommittee that its investigation is "the first important breath of fresh air in this whole foul mess."

He said BMI was publishing 74 per cent of the top songs and added that "not only are most of the BMI songs junk, but in many cases they are obscene junk, pretty much on a level with dirty comic magazines."

Rose added:

"It's the current climate on radio and TV which makes Elvis Presley and his animal posturing possible."

He said it used to be people like Al Jolson, Nora Bayes and Eddie Cantor who were the big salesmen of song. Now, he said, "it's a set of untalented twisters and twisters whose appeal is largely to the zoo-suiter and the juvenile department."

Fashions Turn Up Safely

NEW ORLEANS (UP) — The FBI dropped its investigation today of the disappearance of high fashion originals designed by Pauline Trigere.

The exclusive gowns valued at \$250,000, which disappeared from Kansas City, Mo., last Wednesday, turned up Monday at Moisant International Airport here.

M. P. Chiles, special agent in charge of the FBI office here, said the clothes "apparently had been misdirected in shipment to New Orleans."

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28 Prisoners Stage Protest

HUNTSVILLE, Tex. — Twenty-eight of the toughest prisoners in the Texas prison system slashed themselves with razor blades Monday night in a protest against what they said was poor food.

The men were among the 76 involved in a strike in the maximum security unit last week in another protest against the food. Prison General Manager O. R. Ellis said: All were white.

Ellis said 10 of the men severed their heel tendons and 18 inflicted superficial wounds on their arms and legs. Medical equipment was brought to the maximum security unit, Ellis said.

Ellis said the prison food compares favorably with that served in the best prisons of America.
