

Council Eyes Possible Tax On Stamp Vendors

The possibility of taxing merchandise stamp vendors was discussed briefly by members of the Klamath Falls City Council at Monday night's meeting.

Councilman Walter Fleet introduced the measure with the thought that it is being done in some other cities and for all practical purposes could be introduced as a fund raising source here. Fleet produced information indicating that five cities in the state of Virginia are now licensing and taxing the operations which sell and distribute green and brown merchandising stamps to business firms.

In Roanoke the stamp vendors are charged a \$55 annual operating fee, with 85 cents of each \$100 worth of stamps sold going to the city. In Bedford the license is \$500 annually, with two per cent of the gross stamp sales going to the city. In Charlottesville the license is \$500 and the gross percentage is two per cent, with Hupewell, Virginia licensing the stamp dealers \$400 and collecting 2 1/2 per cent of the stamp sales.

ELIMINATE BUSINESS
Councilman Lawrence Slater commented that such an assessment might eliminate the stamp business altogether.

"I don't see why it would," added Fleet, "other cities are doing it and the stamp business continues to thrive."

The matter was then dismissed without further comment as the council moved into current work relating to proposed annexations to the city.

The third reading was given to the proposed annexation involving property extending from the southeast city limits between Washburn Way and Shasta Way in the vicinity of the Tower Theater, involving approximately 57 acres. Councilman Fleet objected to the third reading approval inasmuch as the council does not have on hand letters of consent from all property owners involved.

Other council members maintained that insofar as the property owners had requested the annexation, and as the property owners are providing legal costs of the annexation preparation, it seems logical to assume that the letters of consent will be forthcoming. The public hearing on the matter will be Monday, October 8, in the city hall chambers.

During the first weekend of the season there were 540 hunters out. The closing date is September 23.

Navy Reveals Test Date

Vice Admiral James A. Holloway Jr., chief of Naval Personnel, announced today that the 11th annual national competitive examinations for the Navy's Reserve Officer Training Corps will be given on December 8. Application forms are now available and must be received before November 17, he added.

Designed to supplement the officer output of the Naval Academy, the NROTC program makes it possible for a young man to earn a commission while studying at the civilian college of his choice which has an NROTC unit. All tuition, fees and books are furnished by the Navy, and the student receives an annual retainer of \$600 for four years. During the summers the student goes on fascinating training cruises as a midshipman. After completing the usual four year college course, he is commissioned in the regular Navy or Marine Corps and goes on active duty with the Navy's far-flung fleets. For those who apply and qualify, immediate assignment to flight training will open new careers in naval aviation.

Police, Fire Jobs Available

A civil service examination for applicants for city police and fire department jobs will be held on October 17. Police Chief Orville Hamilton reported today.

He said there are vacancies in both departments.

Applications to take the examination must be filed with the police judge, located in the city hall, prior to October 7, Hamilton said. The test will be held at 1:30 p.m. in the council chambers.
