## Forty-Seven Northwest Projects Set By Bureau

WASHINGTON (AP) — Oregon and Washington projects totaling more than 113,000 acres are listed by the Bureau of Reclamation as possible developments under the small projects reclamation act.

Bureau spokesmen emphasize that the list, which includes 27 projects in Oregon and 20 in Washington, was prepared only to give a rough approximation of overall potential of the new program set up by Congress this year.

Many of the listed projects have never been studied and might be found uneconomical and dropped. At the same time, however, other projects now considered too large may be broken down by local sponsors to meet cost restrictions.

**FULL WATER SUPPLY**  
Listed projects for the two states would bring full water supply to 33,955 acres and supplemental water to 33,415 acres in Oregon.

Washington projects would provide water for 43,420 new acres and a supplemental supply for 2,930 acres.

Briefly, the program authorizes the bureau to loan local sponsors as much as five million dollars to build any approved project, with a ceiling of 10 million dollars on total project cost.

The program departs in two main points from procedures for the major reclamation activity of the bureau.

Local sponsors would develop and plan the small projects, not the federal government. Also, as now written, it would not be necessary to gain affirmative action by Congress on each project as in the case of larger undertakings.

**LATTER PROVISION**  
The latter provision, however, may be in for a change in the next Congress. Although he signed the bill, President Eisenhower questioned the provision under

which Congress would have 60 days in which to veto approved loan applications submitted to it by the Bureau.

John L. Wolfgang, chief of the bureau's project development branch, said the bureau now is working out procedures for handling applications and expects to be ready to go by the time Congress resolves its differences with the President.

Several applications have been received but the sponsors jumped the gun by failing to have the projects cleared first by the state governor, as the law requires.

Here are the Oregon projects by counties, with the project name, stream location, affected acreage and estimated 1948 cost where available:

Wallowa — Bear Creek, same plus Lostine and Wallowa rivers, 400 new, 1,600 supplemental; Crook — Paulina, Beaver Creek, 2,400 new, 1,700 supplemental, \$1,725,000.

Linn — Brownsville, Calapooya River, 3,400 new, \$1,495,000; Tum, 3,500 new, \$1,790,000.

Benton — Marys River, Tumtum, 3,500 new, \$1,790,000; Jackson — Sardine Creek, Rogue River, 900 new, \$200,000; Harney — Trout Creek, same, 4,500 new.

Baker — Upper Burnt River, same, 1,340 supplemental, \$300,000; Brooks, Summit River, 730 new, 930 supplemental.

Grant — Beech Creek, Magoon Lake, 400 supplemental, \$110,000; Fox Creek, same, 2,500 new, 500 supplemental, \$1,575,000.

Wasco — Clear Lake Reservoir, Clear Creek, 1,200 new, 1,000 supplemental, \$333,000; Fifteen Mile Creek, same, 300 new, 2,000 supplemental.

Lane — Pleasant Hill, Middle Fork Willamette River, 1,000 new; Clackamas — Canby, Molalla River, 3,300 new, \$961,000; Clackamas, same, 2,000 new, \$1,840,000.

Josephine — Lower Ferry, Rogue River, 600 new, \$84,000; northwest unit, Rogue River, 3,000 supplemental, \$71,000.

Douglas — Dillard, South Umpqua River, 4,000 new; Cow Creek, same, 2,500 new; Roseburg, North Umpqua River, 2,500 new.

## Aged Indian Under Study

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — A leathery little man with jet black hair was en route to New York today where scientists may determine if he is the world's oldest living human.

Juan Pereira, who is 4 feet 4 and weighs only 75 pounds, arrived last night from his native Colombia en route to Cornell Medical Center. There he will undergo physical scientific and historic testing.

Estimates of his age range as high as 167 years, but the spry little Indian cannot read or write and does not know how old he is. He agrees, however, that the 167 figure is about right.

Dr. Jose Miguel Restrepo, an authority on human age, estimated Pereira's years at more than 120.

One report has it that an 86-year-old woman in Pereira's native village remembers him as an old man when she was a child.

Doctors who examined him in San Vicente de Paul Hospital at Medellin, Colombia, reported that while his wrist joints and radial artery were those of an extremely old man, his blood circulation was that of a youngster. His heart action and blood pressure showed unusual vigor, they added.

Pereira, said his interpreter Flavio Correa, recalls events which happened in the days of Simon Bolivar, who died in 1830. Bolivar was a South American hero.

Pereira, according to Correa, "drinks when he can get it, smokes when he can and has out-lived five wives."

All four clung to the boat until help arrived from the persons ashore who had witnessed the accident.

Recently a similar wave overturned an 18-foot motorboat at Emerald Bay on the lake and drowned three of the eight persons aboard.
