

# Belles Reveal Recipe Book

As a part of their state-wide campaign designed to encourage the consumption of beef, the Oregon Cow Belles are distributing a recipe book devoted entirely to beef cookery to high school homemaking departments throughout the state, according to a report from Mrs. Joe Oliver, state president of the organization.

In addition to the distribution of the cook book the Cow Belles have made available funds up to \$10 per school for the purchase of beef to be used in senior or advanced cooking classes, the president stated. Application blanks for obtaining these funds are being mailed out to the schools along with the recipe books.

The Cow Belles are an auxiliary of the Oregon Cattlemen's Association who sponsor beef promotion campaigns, and the National Cow Belle cook book, entitled "Beef Cookery" stresses the preparation of economy cuts of beef.

Mrs. Dave Campbell, of Bly, is chairman of the beef promotion committee and is in charge of the distribution of the books and funds for beef purchase.

"We feel," Mrs. Campbell stated, "it is important that as future homemakers the high school age groups be given the opportunity of learning how to prepare one of our most basic foods: beef."

# Lift Contract To Be Awarded

DUNSMUIR — Contracts will be let for the construction of a 2,000 foot T-Bar ski lift on the slopes of Snowman's Hill as soon as details of the land-use agreement with the U.S. Forest Service are completed, it was announced this week.

Financial backing for the enterprise was assured last week with the formation of the Alpine-Western Corporation, headed by Ray Chinea of Mount Shasta. The corporation is composed of local investors.

An agreement has been made with the Mount Shasta Snowmen, a sportsmen's organization, for sharing their land use permit. Endorsement of the forest service is expected this week.

A 600 passenger per hour T-Bar lift with a rise of about 500 feet is planned by the corporation. Construction will be on the eastern slopes of the ridge between McCloud and the Sacramento Canyon. At present the snowmen are operating a rope tow on the western slopes of the ridge during the skiing season.

It is expected the T-bar will be ready for use by December 1, and the corporation hopes to have construction underway next week.
