

Growers Eye Spud Ruling

The Klamath Potato Growers Association met in the Merrill Recreation Hall Wednesday night to discuss marketing agreement regulations for 1956.

Louis Lyons reported on a recent meeting in Washington, D.C. of the executive committee and long range planning committee of the National Potato Council.

In preparation for the regional meeting of marketing agreement committees to be held in Portland of September 23-24 marketing regulations for the western late crop areas were discussed. It was decided that the representatives from this district should take to the meeting a proposal that the marketing orders for 1956 be the same as they were last year if Washington and Idaho would agree to the same standards.

The standards under this plan would be set at minimums of two inch No. 1s and six ounce No. 2s.

Two Injured In Accidents

Elizabeth Williamson, 17, whose husband is an entering student at Oregon Technical Institute, was injured in a two-car collision on OVI road this morning. Jim Kaler of Kaler Ambulance Service reported.

Kaler said he took Mrs. Williamson, one of the two drivers involved, to Klamath Valley Hospital to be treated for shock and head injuries.

Because an in-training class today has reduced the state police forces available, the investigating officer's report will not be filed until tomorrow, the Oregon State Police office said.

Kaler said that because he did not take the other driver to the hospital, he did not know his name, or any other details.

Ray W. Flescher of Bonanza was still in Klamath Valley Hospital this morning with injuries suffered when he was thrown from his auto four miles east of Bonanza on the Langell Valley Road last night.

State police said Flescher apparently lost control of his east bound auto, which went into the ditch for some 135 feet, careened across the highway and went 207 feet in the ditch on the other side.

Flescher was thrown from his auto when it rolled over several times in the ditch, investigators said.

Attendants at Klamath Valley Hospital said today Flescher was "doing very well." He has multiple lacerations on the face and back.

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Ike Accepts Challenge Over Health Controversy

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower told American voters last night he feels physically fit to carry on for four more years what he called a vigorous quest for real peace.

In his first nationwide radio-television bid for reelection, he said he wants a militarily strong and vigilant, but patient and comprehending, America to lead the world to peace.

Several times he took issue with his Democratic opponent, Adlai E. Stevenson, without mentioning his name. And he accepted at the start the health challenge the Democrats have raised because of his abdominal operation last June and his heart attack.

PEACE KEY

Keying his speech to the word "peace," he said he had achieved a personal kind of peace — "granted to me by the mercy of the Almighty" — that gives him confidence he can carry on the duties of the presidency.

"It is this firm conviction: I am confident of my own physical strength to meet all the responsibilities of the presidency, today and in the years just ahead," he said. "If I were not so convinced, I would never have accepted re-nomination to this office."

Where Stevenson had occasional quips and fleeting smiles, Eisenhower read from a text in front of him, frequently raising his head wide grin until he had completed his address and brought Mrs. Eisenhower into the camera range.

"I hope this conviction — this peace of mind — may bring assurance to many others as I stand ready to serve as your president for another four years, if this be your will."

Eisenhower's presentation of his case on a single network, CBS, was in contrast to Stevenson's four-network campaign opener for Harrisburg, Pa., last week. The GOP National Committee chose to leave three networks open for those who might wish to watch or hear other things.
