Klamath Realtor Board Wins Top Prize In State For Community Service

The Klamath Board of Realtors won the prize for outstanding community service at the state convention of the boards of realtors held last week in Salem. The prize, a \$500 government bond, was awarded for the local board's model home contest conducted in Klamath Union High School annually. The bond will be used in future contests. Klamath Falls Board President Deane Sacher, announced.

Sacher said that the local board has received national recognition for its work with the high school students in this annual contest. The model homes, constructed by the students during the last school year, were displayed at the convention headquarters last week in the Marion Hotel.

The model homes are designed, built to scale and decorated by KHS seniors in the model home and essay contest sponsored by the realtors. Homes are built on a 1/2 inch to one foot scale while the mechanical drawing scale is 1/4 inch to one foot. Prizes are awarded to the students for the best homes. The contest is held in conjunction with the Social Economics Department of the school.

In other business at the convention, Klamath Falls realtor Vernon Durant was elected as a director of the Oregon State Board of Realtors. The state group also adopted a resolution urging the National Association of Real Estate Boards to make every effort to analyze the current mortgage situation and, if necessary, seek establishment of a realistic rate of interest by the Federal Housing Administration.

Church To Mark Date

DUNSMUIR — A 20th anniversary celebration is being planned by the First Lutheran Church of Dunsmuir on Sunday, October 14. An all-day program is slated including the showing of the film "Martin Luther," according to Rev. Martin Schabacker.

The formal organization of the Dunsmuir Lutheran Church took place in October, 1936, although the first pastor, Rev. Henry Risque, had been engaged in missionary work in the area for about five years previously.

Meetings started in the present building in 1937 and in 1938, renovated and dedicated as the "Rustic Chapel."

Parish United Effort Program Seeks Funds For Construction Of New Hall

ALTURAS — The raising of funds to enable construction of a parish hall to be started in the immediate future, is the purpose of a Parish United Effort Program announced Sunday by the Pastor of Sacred Heart Church, The Rev. Michael Proulx.

The decision to begin an intensive fund raising program was made at two meetings held last week by men and women of the parish. The project is being called a United Effort Program. The work of organization, education and solicitation will extend over the next three weeks, culminating in a week of decision which will begin with a friendship-loyalty dinner at the Pioneer Inn on Wednesday evening, October 3. All members of the parish and friends are cordially invited.

An action committee of 30 to 40 persons is being named to tell the story of the parish's need for a hall, to explain what financial assistance is necessary to make the effort a success, and by personal calls upon each family in the congregation, to give each an opportunity to contribute their share of the total required.

The goal is \$15,000. It is hoped to raise at least 20 per cent of this amount in cash with the balance in future subscriptions payable over a period up to 40 months. Delbert Fitzpatrick and John Weber, were elected at the parish meetings to serve as executive co-chairmen of the action committee. They will be assisted by an executive committee composed of the following directors: Benito Apocchea, August Dekker, George Robinson, Paul Dolan, Don Flournoy, Rudy Greiner, Wallis Gloster, Joe Thornton, West Williams, John Wistos. Each member of the executive committee will recruit three volunteer workers to serve with him on the general committee. Fitzpatrick and Weber emphasized the fact that this program is not just the ordinary annual appeal for operating funds. It is a "once in a life-time" appeal for capital funds to build a facility urgently needed for the religious education of the children, for organized social activities of the teen-age boys and girls and for the general welfare of the parish.

It is the biggest project in the life of the Sacred Heart Parish to date since the church itself, completed over 40 years ago, was built largely with outside funds provided by the bishop of the diocese, and the personal contributions of pastors who served here during the formative years in the church's history.

The property on which the church and rectory is situated plus the adjoining lots to the east where the new hall will be located, was a free grant donated in 1882 by a non-Catholic friend, L. C. Estes, a pioneer resident of Alturas.
