 WASHINGTON (UP) — The nation's mental health leaders today called for a massive research effort to get more solid facts on the mysterious tranquilizing drugs.

Millions of Americans are taking these revolutionary new chemicals to calm their troubled minds or to lower their high blood pressure.

The experts said "three out of ten" prescriptions now being written by physicians call for reserpine, chlorpromazine, or one of many other so-called tranquilizers. But they conceded very little is known about how these drugs

Evangelist To 'Save' New York

NEW YORK (UP) — Billy Graham's crusade proceeds according to schedule next spring, New York "will be the most prayed for spot on earth."

At a dinner this week sponsored by the Billy Graham Crusade Committee, the evangelist said "we are in the fourth great spiritual awakening in America, but this great awakening has left New York City virtually untouched."

He plans an eight-week crusade beginning next May, featuring a series of spiritual meetings in Madison Square Garden in the evenings and at one of the baseball parks on Sundays.

During the crusade more than 100,000 will pray for the big city. They've already signed up, said Dr. Graham, and "this city will be the most prayed for spot on earth."

But "we're not coming here to clean up New York. We're coming to get the people to dedicate themselves to God and then send them to their own church — Catholic, Protestant or Jewish."

The Crusade Committee will conduct a campaign to raise \$600,000 to meet expenses of the crusade.

The 20th biennial convention of the United Lutheran Church in America, "Brotherhood," meeting now in Kitchener, Ont., is considering a change in name. The Brotherhood's executive committee at a meeting at denominational headquarters here, voted a change to United Lutheran Church.

At the denomination's 20th biennial convention in Harrisburg, Pa. Oct. 10-17, establishment of parochial schools by congregations "where local conditions make such action advisable" will be proposed.

The Board of Parish Education will ask the 700 delegates to approve the resolution, based on a recent survey of the denomination's pastors.

Potato Diversion Program Planned

WASHINGTON (UP) — A potato diversion program, similar to one conducted last year, again will be available to the potato industry, Secretary of Agriculture Benson announced Friday.

Benson said, however, the program would be available only in states or areas where the industry develops a satisfactory marketing program to provide consumers with only the good quality potatoes.

The program will be operative only during the period of price-depressing surpluses.

Recreation Area Grows

SAN FRANCISCO (UP) — The state Park Commission has approved condemnation of 40 parcels of land in the Folsom Dam area as a prior move to state acquisition of the land for recreational purposes.

The parcels represent some 1,235 acres.

The commission, at its meeting here Friday, urged the state attorney general to expedite condemnation proceedings before subdivisions and other promotional projects raise the price of the property.

The commission also agreed to acquire without delay 400 acres in Los Angeles County for the proposed Puddingstone State Park.
