WALL STREET
NEW YORK (U) — The stock market dipped Monday in slow trading.

The session began on a rising note in active trading. But prices began weakening within the first hour and gains were eroded. Losses were steeper towards the close.

Losses went from fractions to around 3 points or so in a few cases.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks declined \$1.40 to \$178.20 with the industrials down \$1.80, the rails down \$2.10 and the utilities down \$1.40.

Volume totaled 1,840,000 shares compared with 2,110,000 on Friday.

Guard Calls Off Search For Two

SAN LUIS OBISPO (UP) — The Coast Guard has called off a search for the bodies of two youngsters who were washed overboard with two adults Saturday when a groundswell struck a party fishing boat broadside and flooded the decks.

The bodies of the two adults, Mrs. Ed Soehnel, Rialto, and Norman D. Roach, Corona Del Mar, were recovered from the ocean by a Coast Guard rescue vessel.

Still missing are Roach's 9-year old son, Douglas, and Danny Walker, 11, son of the boat's owner, Charles Walker.

The four were swept overboard off Morro Bay when the groundswell struck the Sharon II, tilted it heavily and sent a cascade of water over the decks. Twenty seven persons were aboard the boat at the time of the accident.

The Coast Guard searched the ocean until noon Sunday. A spokesman said offshore currents had probably carried the bodies of the children out to sea.

UF Speaker To Be Heard

Carl O. Olsen, passenger traffic and public relations manager for Southern Pacific Railroad Co. in the central division, which includes Klamath County, is slated to address United Fund-Red Cross campaign workers in Klamath Falls Wednesday.

Olsen, who is campaign chairman for the United Fund-Red Cross campaign in the area east of San Francisco Bay, will be the featured speaker at a luncheon Wednesday noon in the Willard Hotel, according to Noel Flynn, local campaign chairman.

As head of the East Bay United campaign, Olsen will be responsible for seeing that some 10,000 volunteer solicitors raise their goal of \$2,027,564. The money raised will go to support health, welfare and recreational services in many communities.

Dunsmuir Sewer Study Planned

DUNSMUIR — Use of state funds on a matching basis for a preliminary engineering survey of a sewer system for north Dunsmuir was approved by the city council last week.

Councilman Fred Lloyd in presenting the proposal noted that \$2,472 was available but, if not used by Dunsmuir in 1956, it would be allotted elsewhere by the state. In order to qualify for this state assistance, the council voted to borrow a matching amount from the city's street assessment fund.

Lloyd emphasized that this project was for survey only and a bonding of the residents would be necessary for sewer construction. He also noted that at the time of bonding, provision for repaying the borrowed funds would have to be made.

Councilmen voted unanimously for the measure.

Scouts Plan Annual Drive

DUNSMUIR — Plans for the immediate start of the annual Boy Scout drive in the Silvertip district were made at a meeting in Mount Shasta last week. Paul Alcouffe of Dunsmuir was named drive chairman and the goal was set at \$4,000. The district embraces Dunsmuir, McCloud, Mount Shasta, Potosi and Tennant.

Cecil Roark, Boy Scout executive of Yreka stated at the meeting that it takes \$10 per boy per year to finance the scout program and that a recent drive in the Yreka area had been successful.
