Former KF Resident Dies

Dr. Ernest Dolph Lamb, well known Klamath Falls physician who left here in 1949 to make his home in San Jose, California, died September 20 following a long illness. He was 66 years old.

He was a member of a pioneer Oregon family. Mr. and Mrs. Francis Lamb. His father came across the plains with a wagon train in 1862 to settle in the part of Oregon that later became Marion County.

Dr. Lamb was graduated from the University of Oregon and later from the University's School of Medicine. He served as a medical officer in this country in World War I.

At the time of his death he was a member of the Santa Clara County Medical Society, The Rosicrucian Order, Kiwanis Club and the BPOE, Klamath Falls Lodge, No. 1247. He practiced medicine in Klamath Falls for 30 years.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Jennie Lamb, San Jose; a son, Calvin P. Lamb, of Portland and two grandchildren.

Funeral services were held under auspices of the Rosicrucian Order. Final rites and interment were in Tillamook, Oregon.

Purvine Asks Dump Change

Continued study by city officials of the local garbage dump problem was given new impetus Tuesday night when Winston D. Purvine, director of Oregon Technical Institute, appeared before the Klamath Falls Planning Commission.

Purvine predicted that the city limits would ultimately extend to the college and urged that the city make "adequate provisions for the future."

"The obvious demands for those in technical occupations to enter industry will force all technical institute enrollments up," Purvine said, and predicted an enrollment for OTI of 3,200 by 1965.

"It is our contention," he continued, "that the dump should be moved from its present location on the road to OTI to make way for future developments." He said three to four hundred housing units for married students would be needed, and that private capital is barred from such developments in the area between the city and the college because of the dump's location.

The federal housing authority has already ruled out adjacent areas for development as long as the present garbage location exists.

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John Howard, chairman of the commission, stated that the problem was given to his committee after the city council had voted to extend the present franchise. He said serious and concentrated study methods of disposal in that city, which is considered very similar to Klamath Falls.

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
