

CHILD DROWNS NEAR KENO

In South Korea this morning, an assassin blazed away with a pistol at South Korean vice-president Chang Myun. His aim was bad and the Korean Veep suffered only a minor wound in his left hand.

The shooting was done by a political opponent.

In Nicaragua a few days back a political opponent took a pot shot at the Nicaraguan president. His aim was better than the Korean's. His victim was seriously wounded, but is still alive.

In election years a lot of us are inclined to get cynical about our political system.

But—
It's a lot better than Korea's and Nicaragua's.

In fact—
I'm pretty sure that IF ALL GOVERNMENTS THROUGHOUT THE WORLD WERE AS GOOD AS OURS there wouldn't be many wars.

The Federal Reserve Board says today that a SLOW-UP IN THE RATE OF SAVINGS—which normally fills demands for credit—has been a big factor in the much-talked-about "tight money" situation and the advance of interest rates.

Savings, the board tells us in a statement issued this morning, have failed to keep pace with rising demands for goods, and for credit and capital to finance consumer purchases. Business demands for money and credit to expand plants and increase production have risen sharply.

SAVINGS haven't kept pace with these increases in demand.

The Federal Reserve Board, through the workings of the Federal Reserve System, which is too complicated to go into here, can create credit, which is another way of saying that it can manufacture money. I think it is better for all of us—and MUCH better for our children—that the Federal Reserve Board in the present situation is advising the saving up of more money rather than the manufacture of more of it.

Big busts are apt to follow booms that are permitted to get too big on borrowed money.

The state of Oregon has decided that 70 miles an hour shall be the legal top speed on the new freeway between Portland and Salem. State Highway Engineer W. C. (Dutch) Williams says this morning the speed on the new four-lane route from Portland to the state capital should be kept at this figure so that a lot of people may be kept from killing themselves this winter.

He says one motorist was arrested recently for barreling along at 110 mph over the new freeway but demanded a jury trial and was acquitted of speeding—presumably under Oregon's basic rule which permits variance of speed according to driving conditions.

I'd hate to see Oregon's "basic rule" abandoned, because under proper conditions it permits intelligent variations of speed, but 110 miles is too fast anywhere, and it is MUCH too fast on a road carrying heavy traffic—even if it is a four-lane freeway.

Suez Bypass
Plan Ousted

LONDON (AP)—Western shippers indicated Friday Egypt's comparatively smooth operation of the Suez Canal has caused them to suspend plans for a mass by-passing of the waterway by voyages around Africa.

Egyptian figures showed daily traffic has dropped only five or six ships from normal since most foreigners on the canal's pilot ship walked out Sept. 14.

The average since—handled by Egyptian pilots and a few Greek veterans—is 37.15 ships daily. The June-July-August average this year, however, had been almost 44 ships.

A London spokesman for the Peninsular and Oriental Steam Navigation Co. (P and O), said:

"We are diverting some of our big liners to and from Australia around the Cape of Good Hope, but not all of our ships."

He refused to give any figures.

A spokesman for the Orient Line to Australia said:

"We have no specific plan in operation to pass the canal. Some ships are going around the Cape. Some are using the canal."

This company also declined to say how many ships have been diverted since Egypt's seizure of the canal July 26.

In Paris, a spokesman for the old Suez Canal Co., said French companies seemed to have dropped the idea of diverting their liners.

An Egyptian canal official said the canal will be back on a normal operating basis within two or three weeks, with enough trained pilots to eliminate all strain and overwork.

U.S. Invites
Reds To See
Campaigns

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States has invited Russia and four Soviet satellite countries to send government officials or other qualified observers here to observe the close of the political campaigns in the U.S. presidential elections.

A State Department spokesman was asked whether the invitation was broad enough to open the way for a visit by Soviet Premier Bulganin or Communist Party Boss Khrushchev.

NO STATE VISIT

He said this "is not intended to invite anyone for a state visit."

Privately, State Department officials made clear they expected persons of much lower rank or non-officials such as professors of law or political science.

Press Officer Lincoln White said the invitations were delivered eight or nine days ago to the foreign offices of the Soviet Union, Czechoslovakia, Poland, Hungary and Romania.

He reported there had been no acceptance yet.

While said American officials expect that if the Red governments do accept, the observers would reach the United States about Oct. 21.

They would have American "official" visas which eliminate the requirement of finger printing for entry to this country, a requirement that the Reds bitterly denounced.

U.S. TO PAY

The U.S. government would pay the expenses of the observers while they were in this country, traveling about listening to political speeches, observing press, radio and television handling of candidates and issues, and finally watching the voting process itself and reporting of returns.

Wegner Tot
Found By
Boat Dock

The body of Timothy Doyle Wegner was pulled from the Klamath River near the Keno boat dock at 12:10 p.m. Friday. The sheriff's office reported the little boy had apparently fallen from the dock.

Scores of police and private citizens augmented by airplanes, bloodhounds and motor boats were searching the Klamath River and surrounding wooded areas in the vicinity of Keno Friday for a 5-year-old boy who has been missing for nearly 24 hours.

The search was started Thurs-

day night a few hours after the boy, Timothy Doyle Wegner, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Wegner of Keno, was seen playing in an apple orchard along the riverbank. MOTHER ALARMED

The boy's mother became alarmed when the youngster failed to return home for dinner. She enlisted the aid of neighbors. Later state police and Klamath County sheriff's deputies joined the hunt.

Shortly before midnight Thursday, Ned Putnam, Klamath Falls logging contractor, flew to San Mateo, California, in a private plane to pick up Russell Cone, professional tracker, and two bloodhounds. They joined in the search at 6 a.m. Friday.

Cone and his dogs were brought here last winter to search for Alvin Decker, a Klamath Falls boy, who disappeared from his home. His body was found in a pond near the Great Northern Railway yards.

Playmates of the Wegner child told police the last time they saw him, the boy was throwing rocks into the river.

While Cone and his bloodhounds and dozens of men combed the surrounding country, other searchers were dragging the river with grappling hooks. The distraught parents of the missing boy stood on the riverbank tearfully watching the operations.

"I don't believe Tim is in the river," Wegner said. "Maybe he wandered away into the woods."

Private planes were circling over the area shortly before noon in an attempt to spot the boy in the woods.

The dragging operations were being carried on for 500 yards on both sides of the Keno Bridge. The water is sluggish in that area. In the event the boy fell into the stream, it is not believed his body could have been carried far from the point where he entered the river.

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Gunplay Leads
To Injury

LAKEVIEW — Richard Fairbanks, about 25, was in critical condition at Lakeview Hospital this morning following an argument which resulted in gunplay shortly after midnight at Hunters Lodge. He was shot through the lower abdomen with the .22 caliber bullet going completely through his body.

Marine Staff Sergeant Edward Joseph Murray, 33, was arrested by Sheriff Tom Elliott. Deputy Sheriff Joe Baptiste and State Police Officer Nick Barry. Sheriff Elliott stated that Murray will be charged by the district attorney with assault with a deadly weapon and arraignment was expected this afternoon.

Murray is from Portland, stationed at the Marine Supply Center, Barstow, California.

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New Struggle For Leadership
Looms In Tito's Moscow Visit

LONDON (AP)—Nikita Khrushchev was reported in trouble with some Soviet leaders Friday and may be seeking the support of Yugoslav President Tito for his policies of de-Stalinization, and easing up on the East European satellites.

Press reports here and in Austria said a new struggle for power inside the Kremlin was back of the surprise trip by Tito to the Soviet Union in company with Khrushchev, the first secretary of the Soviet Communist Party.

Without a word of explanation, Tito took off from Belgrade Thursday with Khrushchev, who had spent eight days in seclusion with the Yugoslav leader. With some of his closest lieutenants, Tito was reported at the Black Sea resort of Yalta Friday. Khrushchev was said to be planning to take him to the nearby Crimean resort of Sochi to see Soviet Premier Nikolai Bulganin and Foreign Minister Dmitri Shepilov.

The reports here and in Vienna said the free-wheeling, free-spoken Soviet Party boss at last had been caught in a squeeze by a Stalinist bloc in the Politburo and Soviet army chiefs.

Former Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov and former Premier Georgi Malenkov were reported to believe that Khrushchev had gone too far in his de-Stalinization campaign.

The army was reported concerned that in trying to please Tito, Khrushchev's policy of easing up on control of the satellites

was being undermined.

The state council endorsed Judge Vandenberg at a meeting Wednesday in Portland. Long said, "I personally recommended the action. I have known Judge Vandenberg for 25 years. He has always had a friendly attitude toward organized labor."

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Indian Meet
Furor Raised

SALEM (AP)—A large measure of agreement was reached on several points here Thursday by 140 persons attending a special Klamath Tribe problems conference, which was marked by energetic disagreement between Klamath Tribe council members.

Selden Kirk, Klamath Tribe council chairman, and Wade Crawford, member of the 10-man body, defied efforts to cut them off as they flung conflicting statistics at each other during an afternoon session of the all-day meeting, sponsored by the Oregon Council of Churches.

Kirk spoke for the Indians who want to keep the tribe and its reservation intact.

Crawford defends the right of members to withdraw from the tribe and claim their share of the value of the property, as provided in the 1934 law which set in motion the four-year plan to give the Indians full rights and responsibilities as citizens.

General agreement was reached on the necessity of preservation of timber resources, respecting the feelings of the Indians as much as possible, eventual self-determination and full citizenship, and extending the effective date of the laws beyond 1958.

Tito's rush trip to the Crimea was reported from Belgrade Thursday as a vacation.

Word that Tito and Khrushchev had reached Yalta—site of the last World War II meetings between Roosevelt, Churchill and Stalin—came from Belgrade radio. An earlier Moscow radio broadcast reported they had arrived in Sevastopol from Yugoslavia and then "journeyed to the south coast of the Crimea where they will be resting."

The Tito-Khrushchev party left Belgrade in a surprise move early yesterday. The Yugoslav group included Tito's wife Jovanka, Vice President Alexander Rankovic and Djuro Pucar, chairman of the state of Bosnia-Herzegovina and a member of the Yugoslav Communist party Politburo.

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Two Soldiers
Shot In Back

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP)—Two British servicemen were killed with bullets in the back along Nicosia's "murder mile" Friday. A third was wounded but drew a gun and returned the fire.

The deaths brought to 49 the total of British servicemen killed since the EOKA underground 18 months ago began its campaign of violence against British rule of the Mediterranean island colony. EOKA has slain 86 Greek Cypriots.

Possible Power Fight Seen
Over John Day Damsite

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Power Commission has set Nov. 8 as the initial deadline in what may become a private vs. public power fight over the Columbia River's huge John Day dams.

Involved is the application of the Klickitat County Public Utility District in Washington state for a preliminary permit that would give the district priority to the site, on which Congress already has authorized construction of a federal dam.

The site has been eyed for several years by a group of private utilities as a possible power source.

The commission has set Nov. 8 as the deadline for filing of objections or petitions to intervene in the Klickitat application.

Klickitat proposes to build the dam, taking advantage of its low financing costs as a public agency.
