New Supreme Judge Sought

WASHINGTON (UP)—President Eisenhower's staff is looking over every sitting judge on the federal district and circuit benches and high state courts to find a successor for retiring Supreme Court Justice Sherman Minton.

Minton will leave his Supreme Court post Oct. 15 because of poor health.

The President repeated at his news conference Thursday his previous statement that appointment of a member of the judiciary to the Supreme Court is advisable.

"If you get the man that meets the qualifications that you are looking for, stands out in the opinion of the American Bar Association and all the rest, well then of course he would get it," he said.

Aiken Raps 'Farm Revolt'

WASHINGTON (UP)—Sen. George D. Aiken said today that among farmers peace is a far bigger election issue than farm prices.

The Vermont Republican, ranking GOP member of the Senate Agriculture Committee, disputed reports that there is a farm "bell revolt" against the GOP because of the farm price situation.

He told a reporter that the issue of "war or peace" is "the number one issue in the farm belt," and on this issue, he said, farmers will support the Republicans.

Aiken also took issue with Adlai E. Stevenson's charge that the administration is "playing politics" with the multi-million dollar soil bank bill earlier this year, directed that it apply to 1956 crops as far as practicable.

"This is a responsibility of the Congress, not of the Agriculture Department," Aiken said.

Fire Danger Remains High

Fire danger on all eastern Oregon national forests remains high according to Regional Forester J. Herbert Stone.

Recent rains that lowered fire danger on the west side of the Cascade Mountains did not extend into eastern Oregon, nor in parts of the Rogue River National Forest in southwest Oregon.

All western Oregon hunters are advised of the fire danger and are asked to use special care with fire in any form. Particular care should be used in extinguishing campfires and warming fires, and in smoking while in a forested area.

No campfire permits are required in any national forest in Oregon. The law requires, however, that campfires be built only in a safe place, after clearing debris and duff to mineral soil, and that any fire be extinguished before being left.

The only closed area in any of the eastern Oregon national forests is the Summer Lake Rim area on the Fremont Forest. Closures will be lifted on the Rogue River National Forest at midnight September 28.
